

# **BIJOU THEATRE FIRE, BOURKE STREET, APRIL 22, 1889**

The alarm for the fire was given at 5pm. on Easter Monday 22-4-1889. Shortly after the Fire Brigade arrived the fire spread to the printing works of Marshall & Co. on the west side of the theatre. Eight people were injured when a wall of the theatre collapsed. they were all taken to the Melbourne Hospital with serious injuries. Capt. Parsons of the East Melbourne Brigade (left inset) and a civilian later died. Others injured were two more members of the East Melbourne Brigade, Lt. Scott of the Albion Brigade, Lt. Thomas of the Carlton Brigade and a civilian.

The Palace Hotel also become involved and several firemen working from the lift in the hotel had a narrow escape when the ropes supporting the lift caught fire.

It was after 7pm before the blaze was brought under control. The theatre and printing works were gutted, the Palace Hotel was badly

# FRONT COVER:

The Year 1889 proved to be a tragic one for Melbourne's fire brigades, when several firemen were killed in a series of disastrous fires.

The first occurred on Easter Monday, April 22 when the Bijou Theatre in Bourke Street was destroyed with the loss of two lives and six injured.

Another fatality occurred on August 10 when a fireman from the Carlton Brewery Brigade fell from the roof during a fire at Robb's Buildings in Collins Street West.

Then on September 13, fire totally destroyed the George & George Dept. Store along with Allens Music Store and several other premises on Collins Street between Elizabeth and Swanston Streets, on the site now occupied by the Block Arcade. Three firemen were killed, one from the South Melbourne City Brigade and two from the Insurance Co's Brigade.

After years of disorganisation, Parliament passed the Fire Brigades Act on December 18, 1890 and at midnight on April 30, 1891, all volunteer brigades were disbanded and the

Items of interest from last meeting:

**Item 1-** The February meeting was the first time that members partners attended a quarterly meeting.

**Item 2-** General Business; Frank Churchill identified that some members were not quite sure as to the eligibility required to join the RFA. It was moved and carried that the criteria be shown in this newsletter. The following is the eligibility criteria as established by the foundation members of the RFA.

Criteria;

Membership is open to all ex-firefighters, (career or volunteer and support staff including kindred industries) subject to acceptance by the Committee.

Item 3- United Firefighters Union (Victoria Branch) Secretary Peter Marshall, addressed the meeting to explain their submission etc. to the Emergency Response Delivery Systems (ERDS) review being conducted by K.P.M.G. consultants.

Peter's presentation, with the limited time he had available, was very informative and constructive, the response from persons present showed their appreciation of his presentation.

The Union's submission and various other documentation has been left with the RFA. Secretary, and is available for loan to any member of the RFA.

**Item 4-** Meeting closed, then the guest speaker from the Arthritis Foundation gave a very informative lecture on the problem, including ways to help if effected by the complaint, new research data and products that are available from the Foundation.

The lecture certainly generated interest and questions. If any member, partner or friend is effected by the complaint, the Arthritis Foundation of Victoria Inc. 263-265 Kooyong Road Elsternwick 3185 have the latest research data and advice on specially made utensils that can assist persons effected.

The Foundation receives a very small percentage of its funding from the Government and relies mainly on community support.

**Item 5-** On Monday the 24th February, on behalf of the RFA., Peter Lang and myself attended the Combined Council meeting. At the meeting a number of points were raised, one was a letter to the Federal Treasurer, Hon. Peter Costello M.H.R., raising our concern about the possible changes that may arise from the Wallis inquiry, effecting the Insurance and Superannuation Commission thereby flowing on to our members. A copy of the letter was

forwarded to the Shadow Minister for the Aged, Family and Community Services, Jenny Macklin M.H.R. as well.

Senator Lynn Allison is to address the next Council meeting. (cont,

**Item 6-** The RFA. representative on the Council, (myself) has been nominated on a sub-committee to examine ways to improve the recruitment rate of constituent organisations. The sub-committee have met and a pilot case has been developed and will be tried in the future.

**Item 7-** Peter Lang who is a member of the R.S.E.A. and sits as observer with other groups is the main source of information for our members who have been transferred from the State scheme to E.S.S.S., (mainly CFA.) in relation to their entitlements and any changes that the government may be proposing etc. as well as other valuable information that may effect all of us. Peter's updates and reports are of major benefit to all. Thanks Peter.

**Item 8-** On the invitation of the Secretary, Mr. Ken Coutts of the Injured Firefighters Support Group and I attended their meeting with the E.S.S.S. representatives to discuss and clarify what appeared to be a contradictory statement in correspondence that one of their members had received. The meeting was most informative and clarified a number of points. The following are the minutes from the I.F.S.G. meeting and approved by the E.S.S.S. representatives.

(a) A person on a full pension from E.S.S.S. may earn an amount of \$150 gross per week, or \$7800 gross per annum without effecting the pension;

(b) However, the recipient must notify the E. S.S.S. Board of any gainful employment they are currently undertaking or intend to undertake;

(c) The old M.F.B. scheme recipients now administered by E.S.S.S. are advised their policy remains the same:

(d) Death of M.F.B. recipient (old scheme). Wife is entitled to 2/3 of pension or could take a lump sum;

(e) All E.S.S.S. members will be assessed in September/October for income each year. The assessment is only for income, not medical, (all reports are confidential);

(f) The E.S.S.S. Board will not investigate current E.S.S.S. scheme over 55 years. M.F.B. (recipients old scheme) transferred to E.S.S.S.

will not be investigated if they are over 45 years, (Note; I am not sure if there is anyone 45 years or less in the scheme);

(g) Death of a current E.S.S.S. member, lump sum only, no pensions. If a person who is on a pension dies after 65 years of age the pension ceases. Normal procedure at present, E.S.S.S. notify the recipient 8 months prior to them reaching age 65 years of this cessation of pension clause, thereby allowing the member to convert his pension to a lump sum payout if they so decide;

(h) State scheme members who have been transferred over to E.S.S.S. was not discussed in detail, however, it was mentioned and the comment was "no change";

(i) Another item that was not a minuted item but was made in general discussion, with this talk about privatisation of Emergency Services, one needs to be aware that if they transfer to a private company and are still doing the same job, (eg Joe Bloggs Fire Service), they are not able to remain a member of E.S.S.S.;

(j) Many thanks to Ken and I.F.S.G. for the invitation, the information gained is important to all our members.

# Item 9- <u>Reunion Day:</u>

Our reunion day, Sunday 13th April, was blessed with perfect weather and the large number of members and partners not only had the opportunity to partake of fine fellowship and good food but also the chance to see the latest innovations in rescue and firefighting techniques. # **R.S.E.A. REPORT**

R.F.A. member Peter Lang, is also a member of the Retired State Employee.s Association (R.S. E.A.) and regularly attends their meetings. Peter gathers information from these meetings and passes them on if he feels they have any relevance or interest to the R.F.A. members. The following are some of the issues discussed at the February and March meetings of the R.S.E.A.

## February meeting;

(1) Considerable debate on Health Care Directives Information sheet, (copy page 6). It was resolved to present both sides of the argument in the regards the ethics of this document which was obtained from New South Wales Retiree's.

(2) It was resolved that the R.S.E.A. exchange magazines with the Retired Police Association and seek other retired organisations to also exchange magazines. (This would be of interest to the R.F.A. and are in the throes of negotiating at time of writing as there are many benefits to come out of this arrangement).

(3) Recommend that the R.F.A. give consideration to inviting Peter Leonard-Kanevsky to address a future meeting. (*Peter Leonard-Kanevsky is the R.S.E.A. superannuation consultant*).

(4) R.S.E.A. are now providing joint membership for both retiree and spouse.

Annual fee is - Retiree @ \$10

Spouse @ \$5

The reason behind this is to keep the Spouse informed of her entitlements, especially after the death of the Retiree.

(5) Recommend that a paid life membership be considered for the R.F.A. The R.S.E.A. have provision @ \$80 with the Spouse @ \$40. Their balance sheet obviously reflects the success of this payment.

## March meeting;

(1) A representative from R.S.E.A. attended the Australian Council of Public Sector Retirees (A.C.P.S.R.) Meeting in Canberra recently and reports the following;

Rumours abounding in Canberra that those receiving a "top up" from Social Security to their existing superannuation are likely to lose it on the basis of a proposed new asset test being applied, this would include the nominal value of superannuation payout being received by the recipient.

There is of course concern at the possibility of privatisation of existing superannuation funds, at this stage they're only rumours floating.

(2) R.S.E.A. have a reasonably active travel club, approximately forty active participants, but are always seeking additional persons to fill the proposed trips. It may be suggested for those R.F.A. members interested to discuss joining forces with R.S.E.A.

# **Disability Retirees;**

I have been informed that 160 teacher ill health retirees have been medically reviewed according to the recent legislative amendments and that 95 have accepted the disability lump sum payment; 14 have accepted training positions under Page 6

the "New Start" Program; 38 appeals are pending.

I am aware that two medical examinations resulted in an assessment that the individuals were still disabled and would be subject to further medical review in two years time.

I am also aware that the Ombudsman's Office has replied to complainants in the negative stating that in his view, he is unable to assist.

# HEALTH CARE DIRECTIVES INFORMATION

# What is a health care directive?

A health care directive is a written statement that expresses your wishes about health care in advance. It gives written instructions on the kind of medical treatment that you would or would not want in the event that you become unable to make that decision. It also enables you to name someone else to make decisions on your behalf in that situation.

# When is it used?

A health care directive applies if an accident or illness (such as a stroke or Alzheimer's Disease) means that you are unable to make medical decisions. This inability to make decisions may be temporary or permanent.

## Who can make one?

Anyone who is competent to make decisions about their health care can make a directive. To be competent means that you understand what a medical treatment involves and what the consequences of accepting or refusing that treatment would be.

# Why should I have one?

A health care directive offers reassurance. It makes it more likely that, in the event of illness or accident, your wishes will be carried out.

## What is a proxy?

A proxy is someone you choose to act on your behalf. When you name a proxy in your health care directive, you give that person the ability to make health care decisions for you when you are no longer capable yourself. Proxies may be referred to as "agents" or "advocates", and in Victoria can be legally appointed by executing a medical power of attorney.

#### How do I choose a proxy?

Your proxy must be someone you can trust and rely on. Whoever represents you must be willing to respect your wishes and be prepared to speak to doctors and others on your behalf. You need to discuss your wishes freely with your proxy so they can make decisions confidently.

## What type of form do I need?

Your health care directive may be written on any piece of paper as long as it's signed, dated and witnessed. (An example of a health care directive is available from our Secretary John Berry).

To a person who suffers from the pain of osteo-arthritis, any research into this debilitating degenerative form of arthritis would be welcome. An extensive research project is being carried out at the moment by the National Aging Research Institute and as there is a better than even chance that many of our members are suffering from, or are in the process of developing the symptoms this project is of particular relevance to us. We commend this project to you and hope that many will answer the;-

Pain research has made significant gains in our understanding of this distressing symptom. Unfortunately the mechanisms which govern pain in osteo-arthritis remain obscure. To date pain researchers have focussed on animal models which involve inflammation of one or more joints. These models have most relevance for rheumatoid arthritis. At the National Aging Research Institute, Michael Farrell and his colleagues are examining the influence of osteo-arthritis on pain nerves in human subjects.

The model they have developed uses the measurement of pain thresholds in people with osteo-arthritis of the thumb. Heat and pressure are applied to the skin over the thumb to determine the "least" amount of stimulation a person will describe as painful. These results will be compared with the thresholds of people who have no arthritis and people who have no arthritis and people who have osteo-arthritis on X-ray but experience no pain. This experiment will provide new insights into the pain pathway in this disabling disease.

Michael and his team are currently recruiting volunteers for this project. The equipment used for this project is not portable and consequently volunteers must be prepared to visit the National Aging Research Institute in Parkville. Michael can arrange transport if this is a problem. Potential volunteers should expect to spend approximately two hours at the institute.

# **"TRAVELLING WITH SILVER"**

Back to business!

I guess we have all stayed in hotels from time to time that vary from the "Waldorf Astoria" in New York to the "Rob Roy" in Fitzroy.

I would like to suggest a weekend away at the "Hotel Canberra", now run by the Hyatt people. No doorman like the Colonel spitting all over you on arrival, no food the likes of Holton's House of Dysentery, which I believe collapsed on his leaving. (The quantity of grease and fat melted in the summer heat and it fell over).

The Hotel Canberra is a shining example of a programme of refurbishment and development with the 1920's character of the hotel.

It's proximity to the old Parliament House and about six Leyland Ladder lengths from the new edifice has meant a steady influx of politicians from the granting of it's licence in 1928, four years after it's opening. Labor PM. James Scullin was a long time resident during the years of the great depression. (It cant have effected him to much).

The original hotel played host to a rich roll call of Pollie's, Royal's and Canberra "Cognoscenti". Currently, a mixed bag of guests are taking advantage of packages for \$160 per room (single or twin) including champagne on arrival and breakfast on the palm dotted Promenade Cafe. This reasonable rate applies on weekends, on week nights tariff starts at \$240 per room only.

This is perfect weekend away territory. The hotel is within easy walking distance of Lake Burley Griffin, National Gallery, National Library, the High Court and the Film and Sound Archives. If you are bone idle you may choose to spend the weekend holed up without leaving the premises. A pukka afternoon tea in the elegant jarrah-floored Tea Lounge with it's lofty ceiling and french-doors opening out to large verandahs.

For fine dining, book ahead for the Oak Room, a multi-roomed wood-panelled restaurant with open fires, faultless service and classic European Cuisine.

The hotel provides a pocket map of "fat shifting" running routes called Diplomatic Dash and Electoral Run, around Lake Burley Griffin.

Then there's the Speakers Bar with excellent beers from everywhere and a great collection of political memorabilia, if you'r into that. Personally, I can't stand the bastards.

It's only a short stagger to the fitness centre, but why do this when there is so much more to see in Canberra. Guestrooms are generously sized with black marble bathrooms.

I would say this low level 250 room hotel is aimed at the upper market end specialising in personal service with butlers on call and built on an intimate scale in a city park setting.

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**O**ur guest speaker from the Arthritis Foundation at the February meeting reminded us that many people in the community do not heed warnings published in the daily newspapers from time to time by the Emergency Services. In this case it was a wheat filled heat pack that was being demonstrated as a therapeutic aid and the following is a warning that was published by the M.F. B. concerning these packs.

It has become popular in recent times to use • therapeutic wheat packs for the relief of various types of pain (muscular, back arthritic etc.). • These units can be heated in the microwave • until they reach a desired temperature (as per the manufacturers instructions). The therapeutic wheat packs can also be used as a cold pack by placing in a freezer.

# Fires have occurred in both Commercially manufactured as well as "home made" packs.

Investigations of these packs have revealed that the wheat can ignite during heating and also when used as a warmer in bed. In most cases the packs have been used for sometime, with constant use resulting in the reduction of the moisture content of the wheat, causing overheating of the wheat resulting in fire.

The Metropolitan Fire Brigade suggests the following safety hints when using therapeutic wheat packs.

- Use suggested heating times for all type and size of packs as a guide only.
- Be in attendance when heating packs.
- Remember microwaves have various power outputs so heating time will vary accordingly. Check the manufacturers guide-lines concerning the capacity of your microwave.
- Check the life of the heat pack according to the manufacturers' instructions.
- Do not reheat until the "wheat bag" is cold.
- Do not use them as bed warmers.
- Do not store away until cold. Leave to cool on a non-combustible surface.
- Watch for signs of over-use, e.g. cooking or burning odour, charring of bag. If these signs are present dispose of after it has cooled down.

Read and follow manufacturers instructions carefully
