CFO Neville Edward Van Every 16 June 1924—10 January 2023

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#### MFB Chief Fire Officer Neville Edward Van Every, QFSM

Born in 1924, Neville Van Every made a significant contribution to the former Metropolitan Fire Brigade (MFB), and his legacy lives on in FRV today.

Neville joined MFB in 1947, having already accomplished a distinguished naval career.

In 1950, Neville married Shirley Aldridge, the daughter of former MFB Chief Officer, Bill Aldridge.

Neville was promoted to MFB Chief Fire Officer in 1974. At this time, MFB had grown to include 1,430 firefighters, 86 mechanical, electrical and building maintenance staff, 60 clerical staff, 14 tailors, 9 stores staff and 2 printing staff.

Under Chief Van Every's leadership, the MFB Workshops and Mechanical Engineering Department built a number of new equipment and vehicles, such as the 50ft 'Wheeled Escape'.

Chief Van Every was an early advocate for the 10/14 hour shift roster, oversaw the implementation of equal pay for women clerical staff, and was Chief when the decision was made to remove all street fire alarms in 1977.

Chief Van Every oversaw the tender for the supply and installation of MFB's Computer Assisted Command and Control System (Metcom), estimated to be operational late in 1979.

Chief Van Every opened the Wheelers Hill and Laverton fire stations, as well as the Training College in Abbotsford. He also oversaw the reconstruction of MFB Headquarters and FS01 at Eastern Hill, which was opened in March 1979.

During his career, Chief Van Every was recognised for distinguished service in the Royal Australian Navy during the Second World War and was awarded five (5) medals. He also received the National Medal and MFB's Long Service Medal.

Chief Van Every retired in November 1979, after 32 years' service.

That's all folks!



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Today, Friday the 20/1/2023 we said goodbye to our Brother Retired Chief Fire Officer Neville Van Every at the age of 98.

Neville, like many young men of the day, served his country. Enlisting in the Royal Australian Navy when war was declared, his five service medals clearly show the different areas of battle he would have been involved in during the Second World War.

Neville Van Every was the MFB's 9th Chief Fire Officer. Adding to the tradition of the MFB with ex servicemen being in the top job.

He joined the MFB in 1947 and in 1950 married Shirley Aldridge, daughter of former MFB Chief Fire Officer. Neville aspired for great things and started his progression through the ranks first it was substation officer then Station Officer. In 1961 he was promoted to District Officer, then Assistant Chief Fire Officer in 1963. Then on to Deputy Chief 1970 before becoming Chief Fire Officer in 1974. A position he held for the next 5 years before his retirement in 1979.

It can be said that Neville Van Every made a significant contribution to the MFB. His Queen's Fire Service Medal clearly shows the Crown was more than pleased with his commitment. At the time he was responsible for over 1400 firefighters and almost 200 support staff.

Neville Van Every was a man who had a vision for a greater brigade and he was instrumental in equal pay for women within the Brigade. He was also an advocate for the new 10/14-hour shift roster.

He was also involved in the introduction of the MFB Computer Assisted Control system. Along with the MFB workshops and Mechanical Engineering department building a number of specialized appliances. Chief Van Every opened the new Wheelers Hill and Laverton Fire Stations, as well as the Training College in Abbotsford and reconstruction of Eastern Hill. MFB Headquarters.

He was also a driving force behind Strategic location of Fire stations that was implemented in the early 1980's

As the chief he would be seen at many of the larger fire's where he took the time to speak to as many of the crew as possible.

A keen athlete Neville was a member of the Gym team in the early 50's a great supporter of all the MFB sports teams he would attend many of the matches. A keen golfer he continued to play with and for the Brigade Golf club.

Also, a member of the Royal Humane Society. Neville Van Every always sort to assist others, in as many ways possible. A humble but inspirational leader, a man that many would argue that he was one of the best Chief Fire Officer of the Metropolitan Fire Brigade.

## The Adamson Family (Part 2)

Keith Adamson (retired Deputy Chief Officer AFSM Reg No. 2687) was appointed to the MFB in 1973 at the age of 22. He graduated from Recruit course 6 with 22 other firefighters.

Keith was a reliever most of the time from mid-1980's and worked at several fire stations and day work positions as a Senior Firefighter, SO, SSO and DO (1982 aged 31 y.o.). Then followed Superintendent and Chief Superintendent. This rank was later changed to A.C.F.O. In 1991 he was appointed to Director of Human Resources.

In 1991, Keith was involved with managing a major incident at Coode Island, which went up to an unprecedented 9<sup>th</sup> alarm and would have gone to a 14<sup>th</sup> alarm, however the computer system only accepted single digits. At times, he was a sector controller and at other times, Keith was the Incident Controller. The damage was over \$190 million dollars, yet fortunately no serious injuries. The fire continued for 2 days and the clean-up for weeks. Foam tenders even came from Melbourne Airport to assist the MFB at the time. Due to the exposure of over 150 firefighters to the varied chemicals on site at Coode Island, Keith pushed for comprehensive health monitoring for firefighters and officers and eventually for all staff who attended major fires and chemical incidents. Keith was disappointed that it was never made compulsory at the time, as he believed that some firefighters may still be alive and or healthier today, if there had been compulsory monitoring of firefighters health.

From 1996 to 1998 Keith was Director Emergency Response (later called Operations). Around 2007, all of the Operational Directors were given the rank of DCFO except for the Director Operations who was made Chief Fire Officer (Tony Murphy at the time).

In 2009, as DCFO, Keith was the senior duty officer at the Victorian Black Saturday bushfires. On this disastrous day, he was coordinating support to the CFA for two days. He reflected on how difficult it was to manage such a large incident (wildfire), attempting to coordinate the many services required and also to manage media requests from all over the world.

In his final year of service, Keith was involved in the development of and transition to the new MFB structure being developed by Chief/CEO Graham Fountain.

Keith retired in 2012 after 39 years of service.

Paul James Adamson (L/FF retired), Reg No. 3320 was appointed to the MFB on 6<sup>th</sup> April 1979 following his two brothers. Paul was a fitter and turner by trade and a keen bass player.

There were 36 recruits on Paul's course. Former CFO Tony Murphy was on Paul's recruit course. After some years of shift, Paul spent 11 years on day work in Fire Prevention, Fire Investigation and working with the fire Vision Dep't. for 6 years with the late Phil Lewis and Denis Rich. Paul was fortunate to receive training at the ABC and Channel Seven televisions studios and recorded and edited live incidents and shows (FireVision). Paul was a member of the MFB band "Muster Busters" that played at MFB and UFU Balls. Paul was also a member of the MFB Cycling club.

These days, Paul lives on a boat in the northern Gold Coast area of Queensland and plays in bands at RSL and Rugby League clubs for the older gentle generation (50+).

#### **Gone But Not Forgotten Alan Eley**

Today, Tuesday the 17/1/2023 we said goodbye to Retired District Officer Alan Eley, Reg No 957. Alan was born on the 2<sup>nd</sup> October 1929 in a house at the Echuca Fire Station. His father was in the Brigade. Being a Volunteer Brigade then, Alan followed in his father's footsteps in joining the Brigade.

Alan joined the MFB in 1953 after several attempts. Once he joined, he moved down from Echuca. In the early days he was stationed at Brunswick (No. 4) as a Firefighter. Alan completed the SO's course in 1959 and was Stationed at Surrey Hills, where he also lived.

Alan continued to seek advancement in the Brigade, becoming an SSO in 1969 before being promoted to District Officer in 1972. During this period, he served at Windsor (35) & again at Brunswick (4)

Alan retired in 1984 after serving the Brigade and Community for over 30 years. This service was not to stop. Alan moved back to Echuca, the town he loved. He joined the CFA brigade and served as Secretary for 21 years and as a Fire Investigator. Alan was still working on Fire Investigation jobs in his last few days. He continued to impart his knowledge to all, with his brigade and fire investigation knowledge.

Alan also received the Order of Australia medal in the Australia Day Honours.

Retirement is about leisure time also and Alan has enjoyed travelling within Australia and overseas, including several trips to the UK, Scotland, Ireland and America.

Alan has been part of the fabric of Echuca and "THE FIRE BRIGADE" for more than 7 decades. A gentleman with a kind heart and guiding word.

Gone but not forgotten.

#### (ROBERT DINGEY Reg No. 2364)



He had 2 older brothers in the brigade at this time. After Bob joined, his younger brother joined up. Now there were four Dingey brothers in the job – Ray, Allan, Bob and Ron. (this must be a record). The Chief Fire Officer was Jack Patterson, followed by Frank Tueno and Neville Van Every. After recruits, Bob was stationed at Eastern hill, Spotswood, Altona, Footscray, Deer Park –Western District. Bob eventually became a Sub Station Officer (S.O.). Bob enjoyed his job and helping people in need. He enjoyed the friendships he made over the years, the likes of Kevin Roderick, Ian Fowler (Mr. Chook), Brian Thompson and Bob Wells. There were many happy times with these men and their families including camping at Torquay. Bob was pensioned out of the MFB in 1981. Our family had 2 grown up daughters and one son. At this time, Bob and I moved from North Altona to Sarsfield, near Bairnsdale, Eastern Victoria. We bought land and started breeding cattle with the help of Bob's cousin Valerie and Bill Pilgrim (ex-MFB), who were beef and dairy farmers in Bruthen. Bob really enjoyed life on the land. He enjoyed ballroom dancing and the many friends he made in East Gippsland. Bob had Diabetes and Parkinson's for many years and we decided to move into Eastwood Retirement Village in 2016. In 2017, Bob had bladder cancer. He had treatment for 5 years being cared for at home. Bob passed away on Sunday, 6<sup>th</sup> February, 2022 at Bairnsdale Regional Hospital with his family at his bedside. He is sadly missed by his family.

#### The Health Report - Shingles: Don't risk it!

Imagine agonizing, scream out loud, 10 out of 10 pain for 24 hours a day for weeks on end. That is what Bernie Blackall of Bayside experienced when he was stricken with a bout of shingles. The high school teacher's battle with shingles began with a sharp pain in his kidney area and a red, blistering rash....then the agony began. "I'd wake up screaming because of the pain. I was desperate, at my wits end," he said. "The pain was unbelievable." Bernie's doctor told him he would have to ride out" the agony. "The pain became so bad, I couldn't function. I couldn't go to work for three weeks. I eventually went to the hospital in desperation and they gave me a dose of morphine which gave me a few hours' sleep."

**Interrupted by Shingles** is a campaign to educate people about the signs, symptoms and risk factors. Shingles is caused by a reactivation of the varicella-zoster virus which causes chickenpox. You can only get shingles if you have had chickenpox in the past, however, most older Australians would have had the virus.

Shingles causes a blistering rash, usually on one side of the body, either on the face, chest, back, abdomen or pelvis, which can take weeks to settle.

One in ten people will develop post-herpetic neuralgia where the pain and tingling can last for months or even years. A number of symptoms can arise before the rash, including burning, tingling or itching, a stabbing sensation, and sensitivity to touch and/or light fever and/or headache and fatigue. In a few cases, shingles will affect the eyes and can cause vision loss.

Shingles costs the health system more than \$310 million annually, including \$47 million in hospitalisations and \$5.8 million in GP costs.

If you think you might have shingles, it's important to see your GP quickly, as antiviral drugs can be given within the first three days of the rash appearing, which may lessen the symptoms. There are two vaccines available. **Zostavax** is currently free under the National Immunization Program for immunocompetent adults aged 70, with a catch-up vaccination available for those aged 71-79 until October 2023. For everyone else, there is a cost. **Shingrix** is a more modern vaccine only available on a private

#### Hey Older Fellas, it's Time To Talk

Forward planning for men has come under COTA Victoria's spotlight, with two of its programs – Senior Rights Victoria and Older Men: New Ideas (OM-NI) – planning a forum for men.

COTA Victoria chief executive Tina Hogarth-Clarke said that through OM:NI and the estimated 400 members across 24 groups, it emerged that a surprising number had not attended to future planning. "If you don't have the capacity to express your desires or make your own decisions because of dementia, stroke or something else, who knows what your wishes are? If they're not clearly known, the decisions are made by other people."

Seniors Rights Victoria education coordinator Gary Ferguson said that through the organisation's helpline, it is known that men make up one in four cases of elder abuse. "We want to provide a forum with an inviting and relaxed environment, so participants are confident about asking questions and discussing options with legal experts present, to better equip them to make informed decisions and protect their future," he said.



This is a story of self-control and marksmanship by a brave, cool-headed woman with a small pistol against a fierce predator. Here's her story in her own words: "While walking along the edge of a lake near my house in the Zuccoli Village Estate near Darwin discussing a property settlement with my soon-to-be ex-husband, and other divorce issues, we were surprised by a huge 3.5metre crocodile which suddenly emerged from the murky water. It began charging us with its large jaws wide open. She must have been protecting her nest because she was extremely aggressive. If I had not had my little Ruger .22 calibre pistol with me, I wouldn't be here today!" said Beverly. "Just one shot to my estranged husband's kneecap was all it took. The croc got him easily, and I was able to escape by just walking away at a brisk pace. The amount I saved in lawyer's fees was really incredible - and his life insurance was also a big bonus!



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
