

PUMPER 35A NAMING HONOURS TERRY BEARDON

Following the death of retired LFf. Terry Beardon, his former shift mates were quick to ensure there was a "Fitting legacy for the role model Terry represented."

The following is the request for recognition sent to the Honours & Awards Committee recommending that Pumper 35A be named in honour of LFf. Terry Beardon. It was written by LFf. Paul Ritchie AFSM and an edited version is reproduced here with his permission.

Terry Beardon registered no. 2577, had been retired for 6 years after working in the fire service for 34 years. He sadly passed away on January 17, 2010. He was a great mentor to young fire fighters entering the Brigade, and I was very lucky to have him take me under his wing.

When the word hero is passed around, there is no-one more relevant to attach that status to than Terry.

He had earned the esteem of all his colleagues. His fire fighting skills and extremely high standard and even the officers listened, took notice and had great respect for him.

On reflection of his career milestones, I would like to recall one fire call attended by Terry Beardon;

Athol Lodge December 24th 1991.

At 22.37 hrs on Tuesday 24 December 1991 the brigade received the first of several calls to Athol Lodge, special accommodation home at 41 Acland St. St Kilda.

On the arrival of the Brigade, the premises 20 x 40 m was severely smoke logged. Several persons were trapped on the top floor of the two story brick building. Eighteen persons of various ages were rescued by fire fighters wearing breathing apparatus. Eighteen of the occupants plus one police officer were transported to one of four hospitals with varying degrees of burn and smoke inhalation. Six persons subsequently died as a result of injuries sustained. The fire was under control at 23.26 hrs

In 1993, the Brigade was presented with the Victorian Unit Meritorious Service award. The award was presented by the then Minister of Emergency Services The honourable Pat McNamara, Deputy Premier.

The Award read:

"This Award is presented in recognition of exceptionally high level of high commitment, expertise and bravery demonstrated by units of the Metropolitan Fire Brigades Board in rescuing people trapped by the fire in Athol Lodge St Kilda on 24 December 1991.

The performance of the units on scene was outstanding and beyond what was reasonably expected of them. Many members placed themselves at personal risk to save lives of elderly people.

ASPARTAME, NUTRA SWEET, EQUAL, ETC.

Are you a user of artificial sweeteners? Do you consume diet soft drinks or food stuffs containing these products? This is worth reading and make up your own mind.

Aspartame Controversy

Aspartame has been the subject of much controversy in recent times. It is a synthetic chemical comprised of 50 percent phenylalanine, 40 percent aspartic acid and 10 percent methanol. Phenylalanine is a chemical that, when found in excess in the brain, can cause mental retardation or death. Aspartic acid is a chemical which evokes a chain of events in brain chemistry resulting in over-stimulation of nerve cells to the point of cell death. And methanol is wood alcohol, which was the poison that most remember causing blindness and/or death in some alcoholics.

Aspartame is unstable under certain conditions, including temperatures exceeding 86 degrees Fahrenheit. This makes the substance unsuitable for baking and difficult to store properly, certainly a crucial factor for soft drinks. And isn't human body temperature 98.6 degrees Fahrenheit?

Approved Despite Objections

The FDA first approved aspartame in 1974, but the approval was revoked due to concerns about the incidence of brain tumors in lab animals. After a change in administration in 1981, President Reagan appointed a new FDA director, and the substance was approved as a food additive, despite objections from the FDA's own scientists and toxicologists. Shortly after, the FDA director who approved the chemical took a job at the advertising firm representing the drug company that discovered aspartame. Nevertheless, in 1983 it was approved for use in soft drink formulas. This too was accompanied by much protest from within the FDA.

Despite these frightening facts about instability in high heat, in 1993 aspartame was approved as an ingredient in numerous food items that would always be heated to or above 86 degrees Fahrenheit. In 1985 over 400,000 tons of aspartame were used, averaging 5.8 pounds per person. It is an ingredient in over 9,000 items being consumed by more than 100 million people in the United States.

Studies Falsified

In a two-year study conducted by the manufacturer of aspartame, 12 of the 350 rats fed a normal diet and aspartame developed brain tumors, while none of the control group developed tumors. An FDA toxicologist testified before the U.S. Congress that aspartame was capable of producing brain tumors. This made it illegal under the Delaney Amendment (which prevents cancercausing substances from entering our food supply) for the FDA to set an allowable daily intake at any level.

In the mid-1970s it was discovered that the manufacturer of aspartame falsified studies in their favor by removing tumors from test rats and documenting rats as survivors of the study when the rats had actually died. This means the brain tumor information was likely much worse than stated above.

Maybe a coincidence, maybe not, but the incidence of brain tumors rose for all age groups by 10 percent between 1973 and 1990, and for those over 65 years in particular, it rose 67 percent.

Frequent Encounters

Aspartame has been shown to cause birth defects, brain tumors and seizures and to contribute to diabetes and emotional disorders. We encounter aspartame in so many food and beverage products: chewing gum, diet soft drinks, children's vitamins and other drugs and supplements, yogurt and cereals. They've even added aspartame to Pedialyte, the electrolyte beverage some people give their infants when they have diarrhea. There is such a lack of mainstream information indicating the dangers of this product that most people don't even know of the risks involved.

When the temperature of this sweetener exceeds 86 degrees F, the wood alcohol in ASPARTAME converts to formaldehyde and then to formic acid, which in turn causes metabolic acidosis.. Formic acid is the poison found in the sting of fire ants.

The methanol toxicity mimics, among other conditions, multiple sclerosis and systemic lupus. Many people were being diagnosed in error. Although multiple sclerosis is not a death sentence, Methanol toxicity is!

Systemic lupus has become almost as rampant as multiple sclerosis, especially with Diet Coke and Diet Pepsi drinkers. The victim usually does not know that the Aspartame is the culprit. He or she continues its use; irritating the lupus to such a degree that it may become a life threatening condition. We have seen patients with systemic lupus become asymptotic, once taken off diet sodas.

In cases of those diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis, most of the symptoms disappear. We've seen many cases where vision loss returned and hearing loss improved markedly. This also applies to cases of tinnitus and fibromyalgia.

If you are using ASPARTAME (Nutra Sweet, Equal, Spoonful, etc) and you suffer from fibromyalgia symptoms, spasms, shooting, pains, numbness in your legs, Cramps, Vertigo, Dizziness, Headaches, Tinnitus, Joint pain, Unexplainable depression, anxiety attacks, slurred speech blurred vision, or memory loss you probably have ASPARTAME poisoning!'

Is it reversible?' Yes! STOP drinking diet sodas and be alert for Aspartame on food labels! Many products are fortified with it! This is a serious problem.

It is also suspected that the Aspartame in thousands of pallets of diet Coke and diet Pepsi consumed by men and women fighting in the Gulf War, may be partially to blame for the well-known Gulf War Syndrome.

57 Station update on Jack Gallop's story by Bruce Thornton

My first introduction to the idea of "the Shack" was through Jack "Wacky" Gallop. We were on shift together and there was some talk about putting up a shack in the forest area of Mathoura, NSW. Jack and I discussed what was needed to erect a 3.75ms basic structure then Jack contacted one of the local Red Gum Timber Mills.

That first trip to the forest site was as mentioned in

Jack's article with a fully loaded trailer in a convoy up the Northern Highway to Echuca then on to Elmore. People familiar with the area would be aware of the dip just after the crossroad, yes you guessed it, the car following me was not!



Passengers of the car were having a drink of tea when they hit the dip causing it to go all over them. I am not into sign language but the hand gestures I could see in my rear vision mirror from the car left me in no doubt they were not happy with me for not slowing down, it was Wacky's idea not to slow down "trust me".

On arrival at the building site we emptied the trailer then both cars and went into Mathoura. On the way I thought the trailer was riding well on the rough roads to find it

had become disconnected and had created its own road marking line on the road. On arrival in town the green red gum was selected and stored in the town's railway yards, we pre-cut the frame, loaded it onto the trailer then headed back out to the camp.

Most of the frame was up that night with the corrugated iron on one wall to stop the breeze. Some of the boys went back into town for "a beer" I stayed behind, as the night was cold I built a fire (timbers from a demolished bridge) I may have made it a bit big as the blokes reckon they could see the flames from the pub and it acted like a beacon for the trip back from the town.

Rising early the next morning we were able to get the rest of the iron etc on, having the shack to lock up stage before we left to go back on duty (Remember, when it's an emergency, firies can achieve).

The key to the shack needed to be kept in a safe place so we approached the brigade to have the key kept in No 1 station key cabinet, which they agreed to. For the people not familiar with brigade key cabinets, if the door is opened without a key it sets the fire station's alarm bells off (better than a safe). A couple of years later I went up to see the shack which was now double the size of the original structure and had a chimney with a one- fire stove. The new addition, added by someone else, had walls made of red gum boards. It was called the honeymoon suite.

For the final extension to be added, the water tank needed to be moved. I achieved this by making a couple of slides where we were able to jiggle it into position, enabling me to erect the new addition.

As with any bush project, one needs to be innovative, the following better explains this point. On completion of the corrugated walls a hole was needed for the water

> pipe, this was achieved with a minimum of fuss, by a blast from a shot gun, creating a perfect 50mm hole enabling the water pipe to be reconnected. This is an old National service trick I learnt.

I like many others used to visit the shack often; in fact my brother's children and mine were introduced to the bush for the first time there. We showed them how to live off the

land, and if that fails, there was always baked beans and spaghetti, they loved it.

The last little story for this edition is about a typical bush joke one reads and hears about!

On the way out one night the car hit a big snake. Checking the badly injured reptile, which appeared dead, we continued on our way. Whilst out, discussion

came back to the earlier incident. We thought to prove the point to the group coming up that night we would, on our way back to the shack, stop and pick up the snake, believing it was dead,

To be on the safe side it was hung out the window by the tail, only to find that it was not dead and it was not too happy about its treatment. Knowing that at this late hour there are no Vets open, it was decided we would do the humane thing for the badly injured reptile and send it on its journey to heaven by a flick of the wrist.

It was late at night and with no shovel we took it back to the shack to bury it the next morning, not to forget where it was, I placed it under the steps of the shack. Unfortunately, we were not able to advise the blokes coming home late from the tea party about the incident. In hindsight perhaps I should have, I was amazed see just how fast men holding their heads in the morning can move when they see said reptile waiting to be buried and believe it to be alive? In fact I think some may have S#!+ themselves.

In my defence I would have to say! It must have been the devil that made me do it.


John Dorman (The Dancer)1939-2010

This award acknowledges the special contribution to the community made by those units of the Metropolitan Fire Brigades Board which attended Athol Lodge Fire."

There has only ever been four Citation Awards issued in the history of the Brigade .

Over his 34 years of service Terry's actions through this fire call is one example that exemplifies the very best of what the MFB stands for .

The night of the Athol Lodge fire it was witnessed that Terry Beardon after rescuing people from the building, single handed had six persons on the lawn and was performing CPR on all of them until assistance arrived. This night and at many other fire calls Terry has been involved in saving peoples lives. The word heroism is exemplified by his work. When there is talk of bravery among people, Terry's dedication and commitment epitomizes what it is to be a firefighter.

The essence of leadership in the MFB is not just to follow process but to ascertain and understand a fluid situation and respond in the most effective way possible.

There is no greater validation than to save a life, something Terry has done during many fire calls. His actions, along with others, achieved a pathway for safety and effective fire fighting. Throughout Terry's career his actions are the fundamental spirit of what defines this organisation.

As a young firefighter I witnessed first hand his commitment to the community which had a transformational effect on what the role of a firefighter is. His actions that day and on many others put into practice all of the experiences and teachings from the Training College. No class could ever have prepared for what his

In his early 20's, Jesse flew, as a 10 Pound Pom, from Soho to Melbourne and joined up in 1966/67 Initially at No 1, Ted Harrison got him an old pushbike (Jesse's only transport). He transferred to 35C, with Whopper, Curlie, Moose, Tiny, Thommo, Thomas, Gags, Jock, Smithy and later Heppie, Dev and many others. He lived at 33 Station, and transferred into Southern, with Clean, Dutchie and Robbie, and his great and tolerant mate Mick C.

He retired in 1998 after 32 years. Jesse was an aggressive fire-fighter, a strong Unionist, and ALWAYS vocal. Jesse passed away at Bethlehem Hospital - R.I.P.

S.T.R. STROKE!

People of all ages can suffer a stroke. It's well documented that even very young children can suffer a stroke and, as we age, the possibility of being struck down with this condition increases tenfold. The following information may save your life or the life of a loved one.

STROKE IDENTIFICATION:

During a BBQ, a friend stumbled and took a little fall.... she assured everyone that she was fine (they offered to call paramedics) she said she had just tripped over a brick because of her new shoes. They got her cleaned up and got her a new plate of food. While she appeared a bit shaken up, Ingrid went about enjoying herself the rest of the evening.

Ingrid's husband called later telling everyone that his wife had been taken to the hospital, but at 6:00 PM, Ingrid passed away. She had suffered a stroke at the BBQ. Had they known how to identify the signs of a stroke, perhaps Ingrid would be with us today. Some don't die. They end up in a helpless, hopeless condition instead.

A neurologist says that if he can get to a stroke victim within 3 hours he can totally reverse the effects of a stroke ...<u>totally</u>. He said the trick was getting a stroke recognised, diagnosed, and then getting the patient medically cared for within 3 hours, which is tough.

Sometimes symptoms of a stroke are difficult to identify. Unfortunately, the lack of awareness spells disaster. The stroke victim may suffer severe brain damage when people nearby fail to recognise the symptoms of a. stroke.

Now doctors say a bystander can recognise stroke by asking three simple questions:

S.T.R.

 ${f S}$ *Ask the individual to SMILE

T *Ask the person to TALK and SPEAK A SIMPLE SENTENCE Coherently (I.e. It is sunny out today)

R *Ask him or her to **RAISE BOTH ARMS**

If he or she has trouble with ANY ONE of these tasks, call emergency number 000 <u>immediately</u> and describe the symptoms to the dispatcher.

NOTE:

New Sign of a Stroke -----

Stick out Your Tongue!

Ask the person to stick out his tongue..

If the tongue is crooked, if it goes to one side or the other, that is also an indication of a stroke.


