

TRAVELLING WITH JIM AND DOT

We decided that Melbourne was too hot, so we took a flight to the Antarctic to cool off. Our plane took off from Tullamarine at 0855 hrs 25 mins. late on 13th Jan.96.

The weather was calm, but overcast, the cloud was solid other than a small break south of Hobart.

This lasted until we neared the Antarctic Continent when it cleared. The first sight was amazing, solid cliffs of ice hundreds of feet high fronting the Southern Ocean.

The plane (latest model jumbo) is not allowed below 10,000 ft. at sea level for environmental reasons. After crossing the coast at Cape Pepin, French base of Dumont d'Urville overland of George V Land. The plane was doing figure 8's so we got different views where we observe between the sea ice and pack ice.

Sea ice is the sea freezing, pack ice is formed by snow falling on the continent and turning to ice (no rain) the weight of this new ice forces the old ice to slide towards the edge of the continent, thus making icebergs measuring up to miles in size. The old ice is almost black. The most spectacular part of the flight was not the free grog, the passes the pilot made around Mt.Mackintosh 2468, Cape Washington, Mt.Melbourne, Pennel Coast and Cape Adaire. He flew the plane like a Tiger Moth, up ravines, valleys and glaciers some of them vanished in the clouds above us. This went on till it was time to head home over the pack and sea ice. We flew over the magnetic South Pole. The Captain explained the magnetic compass was useless as every reading was pointing North also in low clouds pilots had a "whiteout" unable to know up from down. The Air New Zealand crash proved that. The continent is about twice the size of Australia and we were over it for 3hrs and a very small portion. The cloud cleared enough for us to see northern Tasmania, Bass strait and City of Melbourne landing at 2000hrs exactly on time. Arrived home tired and elated.

You could buy it as cheap at Myers back home. They have lots of displays of trophies and artefacts.

Leaving Waterford we head for Blarney Castle where yours truly kissed the famous stone. I don't know who thought this one up but it sure brings in the tourists and the money. Heading on through Cork where the roads are very narrow and the traffic was slow with parking on one side and large trucks and cars edging past on the other. We travel on a part of the Ring of Kerry to Killarney. Our hosts could not believe the distance we travel in a day (420km).

Next morning we complete the Ring of Kerry. The road is narrow, rough and winding but the views are excellent. We pass beaches of pebbles and large stones also peat bogs which they dig up, dry out and use in the fire for heating and cooking. We head back over the mountains to Killarney. This took only 4 hours compared to the locals 8 hours.

Next stop Galway, we have had rain for the last couple of days. The countryside is very lush and green. We travel to Dunmore about 1 hour north of Galway and meet my 4th generation relations who still live on the original farm where my Great Grandfather was born and left to come to Australia in the mid 1800's. We were shown around the district and told of its history including the Cathedral at Nock.

Next day we head back up to Northern Ireland through Donigal, Londonderry and Coleraine for an overnight stop at Portrush. Here we visit the Devils Causeway, a well known rock formation on the cliff side and beach just north of the town. It has a world heritage listing. We continue on to Belfast and after looking around the city and an overnight stop in Larne we then fly back to London.

Green fees were 50 Pounds or \$100 Australian. We head to Dundee then on to Aberdeen, Peterhead and Fraserburgh. This is a RAF town with satellite tracking and navigation. This is also a NATO base. We spend the night at Inverness. There are castles everywhere. We drive south down alongside Loch Ness to Fort Augusta. Didn't see the monster. We visit the local abbey, once again full of history.

We drive west to go over the new bridge to the Isle of Skye. It was opened 2 days before and the cost was \$8.60 toll each way; don't tell our Jeff. We travel back to Loch Ness and on to Fort William at the foot of Ben Nevis. Could not get to the top because of strong winds and fog.

We then continued on past Loch Lomond, plenty of hills and valleys, it is very scenic country. We detour across to visit Stirling Castle (yes another A.B.C.). The castle is being renovated and the army use it as a garrison. They are still excavating some of the old ruins and have found the old kitchens still intact.

Next stop is Glasgow. The buildings appear dirty and dull from the outside. After an overnight stop, we take a look around the city and then travel along the river Clyde to the Port of Glasgow. Taking the coast road we head to Stranrear from where we catch a ferry at 7am next morning to Larne in Northern Ireland about 20 miles north of Belfast.

After picking up another car we head down south through Belfast and after lunch at Newey (the border control is not manned any more since the peace talks but you cannot take any photo's). We arrive in Dublin. A short drive around that afternoon and next morning then we continue on through Wexford and take the back roads through Waterford. Next morning we visit the Waterford Crystal Factory. The crystal is magnificent but extremely dear.

Acting Secretary's Report

Our first port of call was Winchester where we visited the Cathedral. They could certainly build things to last in those early days. The catholics have only been allowed to worship here since 1972. The first time for more than 300 years.

We then head off for Stonehenge. These formations are believed to be 3500 years old. Some of the large stones were brought from up to 360 miles away.

Next stop is Bath, the Romans built the baths up to 2000 years ago. Once again well worth a visit, also the Bath Cathedral. We then head off for Cardiff then on to Swansea, we stopped at bed and breakfast accommodation during our tour.

Next stop is a visit to Carlisle Castle. Construction started in 1122 with work carried through the century. The final building built in 1932. Mary Queen of Scots and Bonny Prince Charlie were among some of the occupants over the years.

On to Edinburgh for our next stop over. We visit the castle, by this time we are getting A.B.C. out, (another bloody castle or another bloody cathedral). On leaving Edinburgh we call in to St.Andrews Golf Course, could not get a game as the Dunhill C u p w a s o n t h e n e x t d a y.
