What to do if your mobile is stolen!!

A little 'get your own back' if you have your mobile stolen. We've published this before but it's worth remembering.

To check your Mobile phone's serial number, key in The following digits on your phone: * # 0 6 # A 15 digit code will appear on the screen.

This number is unique to your handset. Write it down and keep it somewhere safe. Should your phone get stolen, you can phone your service provider and give them this code. They will then be able to block your handset. So even if the thief changes the Sim card your phone will be totally useless.

FROM THE PAST... M.F.B.

It seems at our stage in life, we attend more funerals than we do weddings or birthdays. Therefore, we get to hear a lot of music, albeit sombre or upbeat, usually a favorite of the deceased. One of the most popular is "Amazing Grace", a hymn that most of us at least know the tune and the words of the first few bars. This old song is the most famous hymn in the English language. Many who sing it don't realise the story behind the song.

BACKGROUND TO "AMAZING GRACE"

It was written by John Newton, who was born in England in 1725, the son of a sea captain in the slave trade. His Mother died when he was only 6 and after only 2 years of formal schooling he joined his father's ship. His early life was one of immorality, debauchery, and failure. He was rejected by his father, in trouble with all his employers and finally gaoled. He worked on slave ships and later became one of the most ferocious sea captains in the slave trade treating very brutally all who opposed him. Such was his hatred of God and man that he would often be found on deck at midnight in a drunken stupor singing odes to the devil.

He continued such until he was left empty, lonely and bitter. Then one night a storm struck that was so fierce that he knew the ship and all in it would be lost. In sheer desperation he cried out to the Lord and promised that if God would save him and the ship he would give the rest of his life to the Lords service.

He was overcome with an incredible sense of peace and joy as he felt his broken life being healed by the Saviour's love.

He went on to become a great minister and a leading light in the abolition of slavery. He wrote many hymns and with William Couper published a hymnal which was widely used in the Church of England. "Amazing Grace" originally began with another verse that somehow dropped out of use. It is also part of John Newton's own story -

"In evil long I took delight
Unawed by shame or fear
Till a new object struck my sight
And stopped my wild career

Amazing Grace how sweet the sound That saved a wretch like me I once was lost, but now am found Was blind, but now I see"

WHAT'S IN THAT CAN OF SPAM???

New food labelling laws are a mix of good and bad news for consumers. The good news is that you're told the percentage of 'key' ingredients in your food (some revelations may shock you), and as a follow-on you'll be able to work out value for money between brands as well as how much of your canned goods is actual food (versus the often throw away liquid).

The bad news is that not all manufacturers are coming to the party with regard to telling us the percentage of key (or, more correctly, 'characterising) ingredients in our food.

New food labelling regulations mean the food industry has had to spill the beans. Food labels now have to list the percentage of characterising' ingredients or components in a food - that is, an ingredient that's mentioned in the name of the food, is usually associated with the name of the food, or is emphasised on the label in words, pictures or graphics.

Examples are the percentage of fruit in a fruit yoghurt, peanuts in peanut butter or cocoa solids in chocolate.

While this new labelling is good news for consumers when it works it's come at a cost. For example, we've lost a lot of food standards that specified the 'recipe' for different foods and included specifications for the minimum amount of key ingredients.

WAITER! THERE'S A SNOUT IN MY SOUP

The old food regulations included a list of prohibited offal in the meat standard. This included such things as snout, genital organs, lips, lungs and scalp.

Bizarrely, though, you can now add these things - as long as you name them in the ingredients list by specific name, not 'offal'.

We can't see many manufacturers doing it, though - listing genitals or snout in the ingredients list wouldn't seem to be a big selling point.

Internet fraud getting more sophisticated

The more you use the internet, the more you appreciate its convenience and access to services like banking and shopping. Unfortunately, the internet also gets exploited for frauds that can sometimes look surprisingly genuine. Here are some of the tell tale signs of typical frauds, and some safety checks you can use to avoid them.

Reports from the United States show that scammers are getting more sophisticated in tricking people to give them account names and passwords.

The latest scams have used 'secure sites' (showing a padlock) to give you a false sense of security; others have even installed software that might take control of your computer if you click on a particular link. These scams usually start by sending you an email out of the blue with some story about why you have to reply.

Fraudulent emails:

Watch out - some look surprisingly genuine

How it works

The most common fraud arrives by email, claiming to be from your bank, credit card company or some other service you use. It usually asks you to send your account details, and sometimes your PIN, either by return email or through a website.

Various tricks are used to lower your guard, such as 'security and maintenance upgrades', 'investigation of irregularities' or 'bills or charges due'. Here are some real life examples.

Fake security and maintenance upgrades

- 'Your account has been randomly selected for maintenance and placed on 'Limited Access' status, please enter your account details to reactivate your service.'
- 'Please provide your account details to re-activate your account following the introduction of a new security system which will help you avoid fraudulent transactions and keep your investment safe.'
- 'Urgent, system problems. Please go to <web address> and re-enter your details'

Phoney investigations

 'Your credit card has been cancelled in accordance with Article 205 of Chapter 210 of the international fraud department. We suspect that your card was involved in some criminal activity. A violation of the law is a serious criminal offence and could bring you before the courts. You bank will not be able to assist you until the investigation is over. For further information visit our website at <web address>'

'You are subject to a tax e-audit and must complete the following questionnaire within 48 hours to avoid assessment of penalties and interest. Please provide social security, bank account information.'

False bills and charges

- 'According to our records your payment for your internet access account is late. Perhaps you overlooked it? Please contact us at <web address> to update your details.'
- 'Your domain name registration is due for renewal, please enter the following information exactly as it appears on your credit card statement. This will be compared to the information your bank has on file for your card to verify your payment.'
- 'You have won a free gift (or prize), simply complete your credit card details for postage and handling costs and we'll send it out to you.'

How the frauds get carried out

Fraudsters can scan the internet for email addresses or generate them at random. They don't need an online service providers mailing lists. They may send just a few dozen emails or thousands. Even if only a few unsuspecting people bite, it can be worth the effort.

These emails can look genuine by using:

- the names of real people
- the right logos and branding
- links to pages from the real website
- official-looking fine print.

a site that mimics the real thing. Technically, it's quite easy to copy and paste genuine pages to a new fake address.

Finding fraudsters can often be difficult because their mimic sites often are up and gone in just a few hours, but still long enough to rip-off unsuspecting users

International and local examples

Some of the biggest names on the internet have been targeted.

- ebay this scam involved a series of fake emails used to steal users' credit card numbers and to commandeer ebay customers' accounts and then defraud buyers using the ebay service.
- PayPal users received e-mails masquerading as official PayPal alerts that asked recipients to submit bank and credit card details after the useljs account has been randomly selected for maintenance and placed on "Limited Access" status.
- yahoo users were encouraged to divulge their personal information in response to an email posing as being from Yahoo! employees.
- Melbourne IT deceptive emails lured Melbourne IT customers to a mimic site where they were advised to input their financial details including credit card numbers to renew their domain name registrations. The mimic site had a similar URL to the official Melbourne IT URL address.
- Commonwealth Bank of Australia customers were sent emails advising them to log their account details to reactivate their account following the introduction of a new security system. Although the URL displayed was similar to the CBA address, in fact it directed users to a non-CBA site.

DARWIN AWARDS

Named in honor of Charles Darwin, the father of evolution. The Darwin Awards commemorate those who improve our gene pool by removing themselves from it.

(11 March 2003, Spain) Early one morning, police received a call warning that three robbers had invaded the bar of a Madrid brothel. The police dispatched several units, and confirmed that the call was true. Officers surrounded the building, and used a bullhorn to coax the offenders from the premises.

The robbers, understandably frightened, found themselves in an untenable situation inside a building surrounded by dozens of policemen. Their subsequent actions may have been influenced by the ready availability of alcohol. Instead of surrendering, they decided to

go out in a blaze of glory, and tried to escape while shooting at everything in sight.

The policemen ducked, covered, and proceeded to shoot back at the running robbers. Two were fatally injured, and the third was wounded in his right leg.

Why was the gunfight over so quickly? The three robbers were carrying REAL guns loaded with FAKE ammunition. They were firing blanks, making enough sound and light to fool the police into shooting back, but not enough to actually help them escape.

Remember the "CAS jobs" we had.

Firies on their days off did everything from bringing babies into the world to taking the old worn bodies out of the world.

One of the private fire alarms connected to Windsor Fire Station was Mathews Brothers. Funeral Directors, Toorak Road, South Yarra.

In the fifties, street fire alarms and private fire alarms were tested three times a week and consequently, we (the firies) got know the occupants of the buildings quite well. Some of us were offered part time jobs which included picking up new coffins, cleaning the premises, washing the cars, putting the best grey suit on (mostly hired from our old mate in Prahran), driving the hearse or parlour cars, being a coffin bearer and very often shaving the corpse before final presentation.

Sometimes on afternoon shifts (at the "CAS job") there would be 2 of us starting at 4 p.m. and a third one would start at 6 p.m.

During the summer months it was not unusual for the 6 p.m. bloke to bring in a dozen coldies and these would be stored in the "big fridge" with the bodies. These 6 refrigerated trays about the same size as a coffin slid out from the wall like a filing cabinet drawer. Now! Boys will be boys and firies love a practical joke which works quite well when the 6 p.m. starter is a quiet, reserved, wouldn't say shit for sixpence young fireman.

About 8p.m. when the "beer was brewing" in the young bloke, the senior would excuse himself on the pretence of making a phone call and strip down to his jocks, dust himself down with talcum powder and then transfer the remaining bottles to an empty tray, then lay down with a bottle firmly clutched in the fist

"Hey mate, this one's still in the grip of the grogand won't let go"!!!

and slide the drawer shut. No 2 would then ask the timid one to get another Aristotle (bottle). He would go to the original which we had locked beforehand and then to the only unlocked one, slide open the drawer and grab the first bottle, in the fist on the chest.

"This one's frozen in the bloke's hand" would be the inevitable cry, "just bend the fingers back and roll the bottle out" came the reply.

At first gently and then a tug of war would evolve between the befuddled firey and the "deceased". After a few minutes possession was gained and as the tray was being returned, the corpse would sit bolt upright and say in a deep voice "pour one for me mate, I'm dying of thirst". Possibly the best (or worst) reaction we had was from a very immature New Zealander. Upon hearing the voice from the sitting body the Kiwi screamed, dropped the bottle and headed for his push bike parked at the rear door.

We of course collapsed with laughter, but when he did not return at knock off time 10 p.m., we were a little concerned. The next day he did not front for the night shift (11-7) or the one after that.

In those days if you did not report for duty for 2 days and not notify the station the District Officer investigated. The D.O. went to the rooming house in The Avenue Windsor to be told that our young friend had left all of his uniform in his room and disappeared. We never heard from him again.

would ask for your private account or credit card details by email. If you have any doubt, contact the business through its official site or by phone.

3 Use only secure sites for keying in financial or personal information.

4 For Australian sites, look for the ' au' domain such as 'com.au' or .net.au'.

Australian Internet procedures require anyone registering an au domain to show a link between the proposed URL and an Australian trading entity. To

date, ASIC has not come across a phoney au site, although that doesn't guarantee it will never happen.

personal transactions at Internet cafes, software that records keystrokes. Also check that nobody is looking over your shoulder and keep private information

No reputable online service provider 6 Act quickly if you think you've been conned.

If you get a suspicious email tell the service provider. Do nothing about the email. If you have sent any details through an email or website you're a bit worried about, contact your bank, credit card company or service Look for a padlock icon at the bottom provider straightaway. This helps to protect you.

PROTECT YOURSELF WITH THESE SIMPLE TIPS First, stay calm.

It's natural to be alarmed by an email claiming your account has been frozen or your credit card information has been stolen. Resist your first impulse to reply. Never follow the instructions in the email.

2 Legitimate companies never ask for your account details or your passwords by email.

If you get this kind of email, it's almost certainly a scam.

3 Go to the official website for your financial institution using your 'favourites' or by typing its URL in the address bar of your web browser.

Never click any hyperlink in an email. The hyperlink leads only to trouble.

If there is a real problem, the genuine home page will almost certainly tell you on its home page. You will not have to fix it by emailing confidential information.

4 If you're still uncertain, email or phone the company's customer support department, and ask them to confirm the email's authenticity.

They will then tell you what to do next.

HOME SAFETY CHECKLIST

Please complete this Safety Checklist PRIOR TO ADMISSION to the Epworth Hospital. These suggestions will maximise your safety once you return home.

Access to your home

Clear pathway of garden hoses, pot plants, debris

Ensure entrances are well lit

Indoors

Remove scatter rugs and mats

Ensure clear walkways, eg. Furniture is not cluttering the hallway

Ensure walkways are well lit

Ensure telephone is within easy reach: consider purchasing a cordless telephone

Toilet

Remove mats/rugs

Ensure toilet paper is within easy reach

Bathroom

Remove mats/rugs

Install a non-slip rubber mat on shower recess floor

Tie soap in a stocking or rope on the tap

Ensure shampoo is within easy reach

Tighten any loose support rails you may be tempted to use for support

Bedroom

Remove mats/rugs

Ensure an easy to use lamp is on the bedside table (needed when getting up during the night).

Remove any clutter (eg shoes, chairs, clothing) from around the bed and along the pathway to the toilet

A firm supportive bed will be more comfortable and easier to get on/off Check the height of your bed (the bed should be above the level of your knee when you are standing). Bed blocks can be organised to raise the height of the bed if required

You should have a seat (or two) which is slightly higher than normal (that is, the seat is at, or above the level of your knee when you are standing).

A seat with arm-rests may be easier to level yourself in/out of

Home Duties


Ensure items used regularly ie. In the kitchen, laundry or wardrobe are stored within easy reach (that is, not on low or high shelves)

If you live alone, the following preparations may make life a little easier

Have a clothes-horse ready to use

Prepare meals and freeze them for use when you come home from hospital
