Alex Shepherd (President)


I joined the Brigade in November 1970, where I trained at Richmond Fire Station in Course No.2.

After 4 years I did the SO1 exam and at first completed a roster at No.1 and then I was transferred to No2 (Batman Street) on D platoon.

After a year I was transferred to Western District (47 Stn) - District Station. When the District Station became 44 Stn, I went there. After a few more years I crossed over to Northern District, serving at 12, 4, 7 and then back to 4 Stn from whence I retired

All up, I served the Brigade and the Community for 41 years and loved every minute of it.

Some great leaders here were SSO Bob Burrows and SO Gary Cronin. I learnt many skills from these two professionals. After the great Stn 48, I went for promotion to SO (to get out of 48) and was most swiftly returned to Stn 48 on D Shift as an SO.

A year or so later I became an instructor at the Abbotsford Training College where I spent 2 productive and interesting years on Senior Firefighter and SO promotional courses. Worked here with some good people – the likes of Geoff Patman, Ian Mackenzie and the most interesting Ted Dyson. After being told by "big John Perry" that it was time to go, I ended up at Port Melbourne fire station as I had recently completed the SSO course. From 39 Stn it was No.3 station for about 7-8 years before the big house (No.1 station). I was here for another 8-9 years.

In 2006 I was accepted on the commanders course. AN UPDATE ON THE MFB EMPLOYEE ASSISTANCE SERVICES

The new Employee Assistance Coordinator (EAC):



Fairlie Morgan started as the new EAC in November 2015, and is already feeling very welcomed and supported in her new role. Fairlie is a registered Psychologist, with over 20 years' experience in the mental health industry. She has spent the last 10 years focusing on staff support and wellbeing, and the last 5 years

of her career concentrating on staff support in front line health services (*The Royal Flying Doctors*, and Indigenous Primary Health Care). She is passionate about supporting staff wellbeing within challenging and complex environments, and has a strong clinical focus on trauma and post traumatic growth.

Fairlie can be found at Burnley and Eastern Hill and is keen to visit stations and work places to talk about what the Employee Assistance services can offer MFB staff and their families as well as retired personnel.

MFB Wellbeing Checks: The MFB Wellbeing Checks are a free, voluntary, confidential service offered by the Employee Assistance Service. They are available to all MFB staff members, and can be done at stations/your workplace. They are undertaken by highly trained mental health clinicians, who are experienced in supporting emergency services workers and their families.

The Wellbeing Check involves a short discussion about "What is Wellbeing", followed by the completion of some brief screening tools to explore your individual risk and protective factors. The results are discussed with you privately, and are not recorded in your personnel record or given to anyone else.

The Wellbeing Check is designed to pick up any concerns before they become a problem – they are just like a smoke alarm, letting you know that the building needs checking. Most of the time people are doing well on their own, but occasionally people may need additional support, and a Wellbeing Check can help to point you in the right direction.



My name is Graeme Scorringe and I am the MFB Chaplain. I have been in this current role for three years, having been a CFA & Victoria Police chaplain for more than 10 years. Many people don't know that MFB have a chaplain, so much of my time has been spent making my role a bit more visible. I have found that two of the biggest misconceptions surrounding my role are:

- 1) I am only available to current serving MFB members and their families!
- 2) I perform only religious services!

Nothing could be further from the truth, I am available to assist both current serving members & retired members AND their families with all manner of spiritual & pastoral care matters. This does not necessarily mean religious, and whilst I emanate from Christian faith background, this does not mean that I can't provide non-religious services, or pastoral care. In fact I often lead a funeral service that are in fact a celebration of a person's life.

Apart from leading funeral services, I can assist bereaved family members in all aspects of finalizing a service, irrespective whether the MFB have any involvement in the service. The chaplain is available to provide a basic level of post bereavement support. The chaplain can also assist with & is licensed to perform weddings, baptisms, name day ceremonies etc. I can & I currently visit people in their homes, or nursing homes or hospitals, and regularly visits fire stations, and other MFB work sites.

GONE BY NOT FORGOTTEN

The New Year brings a sense of rejuvenation to all. However, we must never forget the family and friends who gave the ultimate gift that enable us to enjoy this rejuvenation. The committee offers their utmost condolences to those families who had loved ones transferred upstairs. It has been said previously this is one of the most difficult articles to write, not only because of the memories that keep flashing up, but also the need to give all members the opportunity to understand the reason they should never be forgotten. **David Gallop 1944-14/7/2015** David's career in the MFB started back in 1971 and finished when he retired with the rank of Leading Firefighter in 2006. He also was awarded a National medal & Bar from the Commonwealth Government and the MFB Long Service Medal & Bar. I personally cannot remember him well or if I attended any incident or fire that he had been at, so the following is from the many firefighters who knew and/or were on shift with him. It is obvious from their comments he was not only well liked but was also a top firefighter. Another thing I learned was to make sure you never challenge him to a game of golf as he was a very good player. Most of the Firies that I spoke to started by telling me of the many jobs they had attended with him. One would not need to be a Rhodes Scholar from what they said to not realise the community has been very fortunate that David took on the career of a Firefighter, as he turned out to be very good at it. Unfortunately his retirement years did not bring him the many goals he most certainly deserved. Similar to many other retired firefighters David succumbed to life changing health problems which unfortunately brought about his demise.

David, on behalf of the community of Victoria, thank you for being there for us!

Ronald Hayward "Darkie" 1931-26/10/2015. With an icon like Darkie it is going to be very difficult keeping it brief when you could write a book about his exploits. Let's start with when he joined the MFB in 1955 after doing his recruit course up to the time he retired in 87. Ron spent most of his career as an inner city firefighter, (a very good one). My first meeting with him was at the old William Street station and to me he appeared to be a laid-back type person. In fact his brain was ticking over at 100 miles an hour. You would not have any idea what type of prank he was going to pull next. Get him to a job and he would do the work of two. Another retiree Jack Moore, who was in quarters there, told me about a job they were at where they had to get a line aloft to the third floor roof of an adjoining building to the one that was on fire, when lo and behold Darkie falls through the corrugated asbestos cement sheet roof. Jack immediately thought the worst being three storeys up!

Hole A cupboard had stopped his fall. Still shaken and injured he resumed the attack on the fire with Jack. Some years later the brigade built a new station in Batman Street West Melbourne to replace the William St one. Of course Darkie was transferred there. In my travels as a reliever I again came in contact with him there and found he had not changed one bit - still a top bloke & firie with that joy of life about him. When not attending fires or whatever and you are back at the station you would always need to have your wits about you and be prepared for the unexpected "good times". Here is an example of what I mean. Yvonne had advised us due to failing health he was now in full time care, so following our visit to see him John Howe organised the MFB Chaplain Graeme Scorringe to visit him. During the said meeting & as soon as he found out who Graeme was, Darkie replied I did not know the brigade had one -"you can bury me!". Why waste time on idle chatter. One other point I forgot to mention Yvonne and Darkie in retirement were like pepper & salt for the region. They were into everything. You know whatever the area needed they did it. This came over loud and clear at his celebration of life service.

Yvonne, your Darkie as you well know will be sorely missed by us all.

Bill retired on the 2/11/90 but this third stage of his life did not bring Valerie and Bill both all the joy they most certainly deserved due to the major health problems they experienced. Bill in fact lost the love of his life Valerie; the loss of course took a great toll on him but with the help of his family, friends and other retired Firies he picked himself up only to be knocked down again, this time they had to remove part of his leg. Being the unscrupulous type of person I am on hearing this I knew immediately this was my chance to challenge him to a race. So when I visited him in hospital I suggested we have a race around the hospital. I must confess I am unable to print his response. It would make you blush and apart from that I was very busy ducking for cover from the flying projectiles. Now even with this major change of lifestyle he was now confronted with, it did not affect his sense of humour. Bill will be, by all who knew him, remembered as a top firefighter and a great bloke gifted with a wonderful sense of humour.

Mate I have no idea about your new posting however, the best part is you will be Valerie again.

Jack Sexton Passed away on the 28/10/2015. Jack moved from Victoria a number of years ago and was living in Queensland at the time of his demise. The following retirees Arthur Capes and John Schintler are the ones who have been able to expand on his time etc in the MFB. Jack spent most of his time at the Windsor station No 35, for those who do not know much about the MFB, No 35 is one of the very busy stations. You name it they have had it. Add to that, First Responder calls. If you want experience this is the station for you. As I said Jack spent most of his time stationed there. Both Arthur & John, if you have a day or two, will be able to verse the reader on the many fires & incidents they attended with him. In my case let me take you on a trip that three others and I took with him many years ago when we were still in the job. We decided that we would like to go to Broken Hill NSW for the St Patricks Race Day Meeting. The group consisted of George Whyte, Stan Patten, Stan's cousin, Jack Sexton and I. George organised the hire of the plane (Cessna 210) and it was all go. We arranged to meet at the Moorabbin airfield and head off picking up Stan's cousin at a bush runway on the way. The weather started to close in and Biggles (George) landed at the Ballarat airfield while it passed over. Biggles being a member of an aero club allowed us to use the facilities there including a number of cups of tea. Later the weather cleared and we were airborne again, next stop was to pick up Stan's cousin. Me being a short a#&e was required to sit in the small back seat. About an hour and half later Biggles informs us we will have a look at the Menindee Lakes area rather than go straight to Broken Hill. You will all know there are no toilet facilities on a plane of this size and I am busting.

Jack of course suggested I get out on the wing! Luckily I was able to find a sick bag that overcame the problem. When we do land at Broken Hill they form a guard of honour whilst I alight from the plane with the bag. For the rest of the trip I became known as the Piss Ant. In fact, I was presented on stage at one of the clubs we visited with a colostomy type bag with suitable appendage attachment for the trip home. Of course I refused to test it in front of everybody. It was one of those once in a life time trips. We spent a whole shift down the mines, attended a very large two up game and also the country race meeting with people who flew in from all over the place. Because of Stan's extended family we were shown over many things one would normally not be able to see. Jack being Jack helped make the trip. On arrival back at Moorabbin, the plane, as the norm, had to be cleaned and filled similar to hiring a car etc. We planned to do the trip again if we could arrange our four days off. Unfortunately this never came to fruition. In retirement Jack would often ring and keep me up to speed on his health or whether he would be down for the UFU"s Annual Christmas Luncheon. He loved being amongst the other retirees, however it was very obvious early in 2015 it was not going to ever happen again.

Mate, I have got to say to your son and family, the brigade Chaplin and the Firies from No.10 Station made sure you were given a great send off at the spreading of your ashes.

Frederick Leonard "Len" Sixsmith. 1931-**23/11/2015.** The morning of the 23/11/15 I received a phone call from a very close friend of Len's. It was RFA member Bernie Bishop advising me that Len had unexpectantly passed away. It was obvious from his voice it was not expected. Bernie's friendship with Len started many years ago when they were workmates in the MFB Fire Protection Department. Following Bernie's call, the normal protocol re: information transfer on Len's demise etc, was forwarded and the glowing comments I received during said calls about Len's contribution to the brigade, his workmates, the community and new immigrants to the country was amazing. I do not think I have ever heard a person being as highly praised before. Retired Chief, Laurie Lavelle forwarded to me some notes regarding his association with Len, also informing me to personally pass on to the family his apologies as he would be unable to attend the service. He and his family would be visiting his sister who only just returned home to Clunes from hospital. The notes clearly showed the versatility of Len and his ability as a firefighter. From all these glowing comments it is not hard to understand why he reached the rank of ACFO. Remember back then there was only an Administration and an Operational one, unlike the current rank structure. Well in my case one could say I did not get off on a high with Len. Lt me explain. Many years ago

he was the DO in charge of No1's Hose Carriage. I was a sub station officer on the combination ladder and the crew with me beat the carriage crew to run a line on a fire in Carlton—utter sacrilege!. After we had made up with the DO he wanted to know if I had ordered that line to be run, I replied yes, expecting the worst but all he said was I see. Let's move forward a number of years to when I was transferred into the administration area. Reporting to Len, on my first day there, as the norm, I received my pep talk re my role, when he suddenly opens up about the job in Carlton, expecting to be told it was a no-no. He states, I just want you to know I have a good memory and started laughing. I found he was a good boss to work for. The only down side was the fact he was preparing to take up the early optional of retirement and all his wealth of knowledge was being lost to the job. I am not sure if most know just how much people like Len and his ilk did in protecting the community and firefighters. The battles they undertook and in most cases, won against developers/builders and the experts who wanted to build structures and high rise buildings without proper consideration for the people who would inhabit them and the equipment etc firefighters required to protect their lives and the property of the said buildings. This knowledge came from not only attending the various fires but also from a great deal of home work on Len's part.

A LITTLE INTELLIGENCE

GOLD MEDALIST ATTENDS AGM

What an honour it was for all of those who attended the RFA AGM. The guest speaker on the day was Carol Cooke AM. She was gold medallist in the Paralympics.

Carol shared with us some of her life and the experiences which drastically changed her life. Some of these included moving to the other side of the world and what she thought at the time to be a devastating diagnosis of a chronic illness. Compounding the chronic illness with a cancer scare and a major life-changing surgery.

Carol shared her life story starting with being born in Toronto, Canada. During her youth years she was involved in a number of sports including gymnastics and swimming.

Her career path saw her follow in the footsteps of her parents and become a police officer at the Metropolitan Toronto Police Force. During her career she spent the first few years as a uniformed officer, then became an undercover officer for years in the prostitution and drug areas and then finally as a detective constable in the Criminal Investigation Bureau

In 1985, the very first World Police and Fire Games were held in San Jose, California. This is where her friendship with some of the MFB officers and their wives began. Especially building a wonder relationship with John Howe (Howie) and his family.

In 1992 she look leave and came to Australia for 12 months. Not long after this she moved to Australia. In 1998 she was diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis. However she was determined that MS was not going to define who she was. As with all MS sufferers this didn't happen overnight and in 2001 she was introduced to a future disabled lifestyle.

In trying to get her health and fitness back on track, she started the 24 Hour Mega Swim, which is a charity event to raise money for the Go for Fold Scholarship Program run by the Victoria's MS Society. This program gives people living with MS the opportunity to follow their dreams. To date this swim has raised a total of \$6 million dollars. Carol was lucky enough through her career to become an actual recipient of one of the scholarships.

In 2003 Carol experienced another health setback whereby in the end she had to go through major surgery and have her large intestine removed.

Unfortunately the MS got worse, which then meant additional rehab to try and learn to walk again. Once back on track she then experienced another medical set back—cancer.

In 2005, the World Masters Games were being held in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada and for the first time in the history of these games they had a Paralympics classification in both swimming and athletics. At these games she won a silver medal and 4 Gold Medals. Later that year she was asked by the Australian Paralympics Development people to take up the sport of rowing. Rowing was to be a new sport for the 2008 Beijing Paralympics.

In 2007 she obtained her first national title in the boat category of the double scull. In 2008 she was named as a member of the national team. Unfortunately her coxed four boat team failed to qualify for the Paralympics that year.

In 2009 her team was named as part of the team to travel to Poland for the World Rowing Championships at which they made the final and came in 6th place.

In 2011 she decided to switch sports to cycling. Due to the impact of MS on her body she was unable to ride a normal bike. However there was a category for trikes.

In 2011 after attending the Australian national Para-Cycling Championships during April in Queensland, Carol qualified for the national team in the T2 category. Later that year Carol travelled to her first Work Para-Cycling Championships in Denmark whereby she was beaten by a Canadian girl however obtained a silver medal. She then competed in a road race where she came in second. Amazing that her bike weighed in at 22kgs. What an achievement.!

Her ultimate goal was to make the team for London 2012. This involved dedicated training and nutrition and at the same time she was presented with a trike that weighed 14kgs. At the end of 2012 she was officially part of the Australian cycling team to go to London. At one point her position on the team was challenged by another rider, however her dream of representing her adopted country finally came true.

Carol shared with us that the gold medal really just topped it all off. For her to be able to make the team, then compete and to do her personal best was all she could have dreamed of.

In 2013 Carol had wins in the third World cup that year and also in the 2013 World Championships and becoming World Champion in the time trial and road race.

Carol brought with her, her gold medal and also the trike that was on the back of her car as she had already been for a training ride that morning.

If we were to take a piece out of Carol's inspirational life story it would be that although life's journey can be unexpected you can take control of your life and continue in any direction that you choose to.

Carol has released a book which I will be honest with you and say is a most inspirational life story which I recommend everyone should take the chance to read. "Cycle of Life" - a Gold Medal Paralympian's secrets to success by Carol Cooke AM.

ANSWERS TO THE CFA FIRE READY QUIZ

Question 1. True

Victoria is one of the most bushfire prone regions in the world because of its weather patterns and vegetation. Other bushfire prone areas include California and Spain. So remember, if you live in or are visiting a high risk bushfire area in Victoria, you need to know which fire weather district you're in. Check your Fire Danger Rating daily and have a bushfire survival plan.

Question 2. True

Bush and grassfires can occur where suburbs meet the bush or where houses have grassland, parkland or bush around them. People who travel or holiday in high risk bushfire areas are also at risk of bushfire. Even people considering a day trip should be prepared.

Question 3. False

Rainfall fuels the growth of vegetation – especially grass – meaning that higher rainfall can actually result in greater fuel loads for fire. In years of wet weather Victoria often sees an increase in the number of large grassfires. It only takes two weeks of hot, dry and windy weather to create dangerous fire conditions

Question 4. *True*

Victoria is a large state with varying landscapes and weather conditions. As such, your Fire Danger Rating is determined by the district where you are living or travelling.

It's your responsibility to know which district you're in (there are nine in Victoria) and to check the rating.



Question 5. True

Solid and liquid-fuel barbecues and ovens are banned on Total Fire Ban days. However, gas or electrical barbecues that are fixed appliances – built into permanent structures of brick, stone or concrete – ARE allowed, provided you adhere to the guidelines for use. Portable gas or electric barbecues are also allowed if they are commercially manufactured exclusively for meal preparation and you make sure they are in a stable position when alight

Question 6. False

Clearing up around your property is just one part of planning and preparing for bushfire. You need a well thought-out bushfire survival plan, which has been agreed and discussed with members of the household. While leaving early is always the safest option, there are many things you can do to prepare you and your family for bushfire.

Question 7. False

Don't wait to receive a warning. It's up to you to know when to leave. It's your responsibility to make the best possible decision for your family based on the current Fire Danger Ratings and official warnings for your area.

Question 8. True

Homes are not designed or constructed to withstand fires in these conditions. Defending a house requires at least two able-bodied, fit and determined adults who are physically and mentally prepared to work long and hard in arduous and difficult conditions. Code Red days are rare — when forecast they are very serious.

Question 9. False

There are no guarantees that fire crews will attend your property. CFA firefighters will be doing everything they can to prevent injury to people and damage to property during a bushfire. But you should never expect a fire truck at your door to personally protect you and your home.
