SECRETARY/TREASURER'S REPORT

Hello all. I would like to start my quarterly report with a little reflection on a bygone time.

Prior to the start of the UFU's parade & family day, the many that attended had the opportunity to see

two of the long gone icons, the fire horses, steamers and hose carts. The horses and appliances created a great deal of excitement by their presence, similar to what I imagine would have occurred when they came charging down the road in their heyday.

Now it just so happens one of our members, retired District Officer Ken Murphy, had sent me a comprehensive report on his family's journey through time with the brigade. His late father Henry Cyril Murphy came to Melbourne to play football and joined the brigade in 1913. Ken, you could say, was almost born at Eastern Hill as a few days after his birth his mother and father took him back to quarters at the old Eastern Hill Fire Station. In the articles he talks about the stories his dad told him about the horses as there were still stations with them when his father joined the brigade.

With the aid of Ken's documents I will touch briefly on the interesting period of the fire horse. The fire horses had to be sturdy animals between the ages of 5 and 7 years and quiet to ride and drive and be approximately 15.3 to 16 hands high. The breed stock used came from America, the animals were very lightly shod and ran mainly on the natural frog of the foot, making them very sure-footed. Because of this they could not be used to do a hard day's work. Contrary to general belief they were not owned by the Brigade but were on hire from large contractors. The drivers (Coachmen) were not firemen, however the Chief Officer always saw the applicants personally.

A couple of other interesting facts: If it was a fire the coachman would remove the horses from the steamers because of the noise, vibration and the smoke, he would also be required to keep the coal up to the steamer. Often they would be needed to ride one of the horses back to the station to give word-back.

The Crews on the appliance would assist in keeping the horses excited when going to a call, by calling out loud "Hi" "Hi" this helped ensure the horses galloped all the way, if going up a hill they would jump off and help push the appliance. Just imagine riding on a steamer appliance going to a call with the horses galloping at full speed and you screaming out to keep them going as fast as they could go; we thought riding in the old open hose carriage was exciting. I have no doubt a turn-out behind a pair of galloping horses would have the old heart beating faster than in the old open appliances.

GRAEME "BLUEY" BILLINGTON 1936-2011

Bluey joined the MFB in 1961 but I did not get to know him until later however I must admit I had heard about this tough raw-boned firie who was in the successful 1963 mid-week premiership side of the MFB.

I first got to work with him when I was relieving at the old North Melbourne station, let me tell you I found him not big on Pomp & Ceremony but a top firie, a bloke with a very dry wit and a great sense of humour who enjoyed the mateship that the fire service brought. I know there are many of you old blokes from the brigade who will have a story or two about "Bluey".

My last conversation with him was in 2010 when he was in the Royal Melbourne Hospital. I know he would not be upset with me telling all of you about it. The story will, I believe, give you an insight into the unique character he was. Of course I will not use all of his colourful terminology, it went like this.

I rang to see if I was allowed to visit & during discussion with the Sister in charge, she enquired if I would like to speak to him as he was standing next to her. Bluey came on the phone; "Ant did you send in this box of fruit". "No Blue, it's from the union"! Well it's great and I'm taking it home to the grandkids. "I want to know if I can come and see you?" No Ant, I am going home to my daughter, the grandkids and fishing. The XXXX Doctors want to start me on all this XXXX, I asked if it would cure me, I'm not happy with their answer so I told them stick it; I'm not going to keep causing problems for the daughter, I'm going home to enjoy the time I have left, doing the things I want to do, not all this bullXXXX their talking about.

I, unfortunately, did not realise the gravity of his condition and failed to take the opportunity to find out the address in Warrnambool where he was going to stay and missed out speaking to him again. I know the people that knew Bluey will all tell you he was the genuine article, he will not be forgotten. <u>TURBULENT TIMES OF THE</u> <u>MELBOURNE FIRE BRIGADES</u> <u>1835 – 1970</u>

Author, Les Gray, continues with his insight into the early days of Melbourne's Fire Services. .

The above men provided Chief Officer Stein with the money allowing him to get on with the task of organising and running the fledgling Melbourne Fire Brigades. In addition to these positions on the Board, Mauger, Ballinger and de Kellett still turned out to fires for another 6-7 years..

At the time of writing this instalment new information has come to hand and, as a result, I have to regress into the past from time to time allowing readers to have a better background knowledge of some of the men that I have mentioned in the previous instalment, in order to tell of the roles they played in firefighting at the time and for their input into the draft bill for the M.F.B. Act 1890.

Three of the first board members above namely Mauger, Ballenger, and deKellett served on the M.F.B. Board for many years to come, I will mention another man here who was never a member of the Melbourne Fire Brigade, but contributed so much towards its existence, his name was Theophilus Smith-Marshall, whose occupation was school teaching and in 1870 he was posted to Chiltern as Head Teacher, whilst there he participated in the formation of the Chiltern Fire Brigade and was appointed as its first Captain.

In 1880 he returned to Melbourne, as Head Teacher of the Kensington School (a promotion). I have no record of when the Kensington Volunteer Brigade was founded, but it is recorded that he was their first Captain. It is reasonable to assume that he played a part in its formation some time in 1880? In 1883 he was elected President of the Metropolitan Fire Brigades Association. He worked on the draft bill for the amalgamation of the volunteer brigades for seven years which entailed over 50 meetings. Circa late 1890's he retired from active fire fighting and his intention was to focus entirely on his school teaching career.

As you have read in the previous instalment on the 24th. May 1883, Capt. Kelly of the Prahran Municipal Brigade convened a meeting of interested Fire Officers to form an association, (The Metropolitan Fire Brigades Association) their main objective was the passing of a bill in parliament for the amalgamation of all brigades in Melbourne into one Brigade, at this meeting some 30 Officers attended and a committee of 7 men were elected to the committee, they were Capt. Kelly, Prahran Brigade, Capt. T.S. Marshall, Kensington Brigade, (Chairman of the meeting) Capt. Sir. Henry de Kellett, Kew Municipal Brigade, Supt. S. Mauger, Clifton Hill volunteer temperance Brigade, (who possibly took the minutes) Supt. J. Ballenger, Carlton United Breweries Brigade, Messrs. Kay, and W. Keele, (insurance companies representatives), T.S. Marshall was elected President, S. Mauger, hon.secretary.

As a result of this meeting five men were selected to work on a draft bill for amalgamation. They were Supt. Hoad, (when Hoad retired Supt. Stein replaced him). Supt. Mauger, Supt. Ballenger, Capt. de Kellett, and Capt. Marshall.

In 1889 to hasten the introduction of the bill a large deputation from the Victorian Fire Brigades Association, mostly from the country, was received by the Chief Secretary, the Hon. Alfred Deakin, Capt. Marshall even though retired from fire fighting was invited to attend as he was the only one that had intimate knowledge of brigade functions in the city and country. Most delegates wanted 2 Boards, one for Metropolitan Melbourne and the other for the Country, instead of one for whole State. Marshall strongly advocated for 2 Boards, a paid system for the Metropolitan area and a volunteer one for the country. This actually suited the Government, Councils and Insurance Companies, otherwise the cost would have been prohibitive.

The facts of the matter expounded by the deputation impressed The Chief Secretary and on the delegation retiring Marshall had a personal interview with Deakin at his request, he went more fully into his reasons for 2 boards, as a result of the days proceedings a Bill embodying the 2 boards, Metropolitan and Country was drafted. The draft bill was presented to the Chief Secretary, the Hon. Alfred Deakin who in 1890 introduced it to the Legislative Assembly. It was presented again to the next session of parliament for its second reading and was ratified.

The Fire Brigades Act was passed in December 1890 with provision for a Country Fire Brigades and was written into the Statute Book and became Law. The Melbourne Fire Brigades Board met for the first time on 6th. March 1891 in the Melbourne Town Hall.

The Melbourne Fire Brigades Board was proclaimed a Body Corporate, having its own seal, with succession of its Chief Officers, it's boundaries were fixed at a 10 mile radius from the Melbourne Post Office. The M.F.B. Act named the Victorian Government, Municipalities and Fire Insurance Companies as contributors towards the maintenance of both Brigades and the administration by their Boards.

On the 1st. May 1891, Stein was appointed Chief Officer, Messer's. E.S. Watson (an insurance company representative) was appointed first president of the M.F.B. Board and J.H. Scattergood as first secretary, (he was a former Clerk to Supt. Stein) the M.F.B. Board decided to purchase the whole of the existing plant and suitable buildings of the volunteer brigades at the current valuation, after all their debts were paid, the balance was handed to the members of the volunteer brigades as a small recognition of their many years of service to their communities.

Stein took over the men from his old insurance companies brigades, many of the former volunteers joined the Melbourne Fire Brigade and others as auxiliary firemen.

Stein was paid 800 pounds per annum, and supplied with quarters, Archibald Mc Dowell as Deputy Chief Officer was paid 250 pounds with quarters, District Superintendents 150 pounds with quarters, Station Foremen 110 pounds with quarters, permanent firemen 100 pounds with quarters. The auxiliary firemen were paid a retainer of 16 shillings per month, and depending on their ranking they were paid 6 shillings to 2 shillings and sixpence per hour for attending fires.

Chief Officer David Stein was given powers to command and manage the M.F.B. in the saving of lives and property in Melbourne's Fire Districts, general orders and regulations were written up to enforce the fire fighters obedience to the Board and its Chief Officer. A system of fines, suspensions and demotions in rank or instant dismissal and other forms of punishment could be administered as well, drinking, smoking

and playing cards were allowed on the stations, no swearing or gambling was to be tolerated. Stein took a hard line on any person who was under the influence of alcohol whilst on duty, often ordering the loss of a weeks pay. If a person was suspended from duty he suffered loss of pay until the Chief decided his fate.

As you have previously read, Stein, many years before whilst serving in the London Fire Brigade, had personal experience of being suspended. He knew quiet well how the abuse of the system operated and should be handled as were the men. The other side of Stein, when dealing with men who had bent the rules, particularly if they were generally diligent and of good character, was inclined to be lenient when deciding what sort of punishment was to be administered. It was said of him that he was a hard man but a fair man, most importantly the men knew where they stood with him.

The old Insurance Co's head station built in 1882 located at 447 Little Bourke Street, was constructed of brick with basement, ground floor with engine room and stables for horses and a feed store, with 100ft. high brick fire watching tower at rear, the top floor had accommodation for 20 permanent men with essential amenities and a billiard room. Stein made it his headquarters until the new Headquarters Station No.1, at Eastern Hill was opened in 1893. The old station remained in commission until it was sold in 1919.

By the end of 1891 Stein had a permanent force of 59 paid men, 209 auxiliary partially paid men, 4 Steam engines, several manual engines, 25 hose carts, 58 hand reels, 3 extension ladders, 33 horses, 71,080 feet of hose, 49 Fire Stations, 48 Telephones, 8 private fire alarms and several fire alarm circuits connected to his head station. By 1892 he had 83 permanent men, 229 auxiliary firemen and 48 Fire stations in Melbourne and its districts. The permanent men worked 6 days straight and had 1 day per

week off and were granted 3 days annual leave per year. All of the outer volunteer suburban stations were equipped with hand pulled hose reels, the men referred to them as "the old iron horses" they were constructed on an iron chassis which were attached to a large axle with 2 light weight wooden spoked artillery type iron shod wheels, with a pulling pole attached at front with a wooden bar attached at right angles allowing for men to push on and others pushed from the rear. They were heavy cumbersome apparatus and if they had long distances to travel up to 10 or more firemen and auxiliaries could be pulling and pushing them along with ropes attached, and they could carry up to 4 - 6 lengths of 100 feet $2 \frac{1}{2}$ dia. hose wound around the reel. Carried at front or rear on the chassis. in a box like compartment were a Stand Pipe, Branch, and various size nozzles and other pertinent small gear, the District Stations having, in addition, a manually hand operated engine.

There were ample horses stabled in the inner stations to pull the Steamers, the 25 horse pulled Hose Reels, and a number of Hose Carts, the 3 Extension Ladders, the 56 feet high Shand Mason, 65 feet Hayes La France and the old 72 feet Italian Ladder, he also had several wheeled single horse drawn "Curricle" fire escapes carried on Ladder Carts and a similar Shand Mason "Telescopic" Fire escape Ladder cart, they were ideal for a quick get to work in confined spaces and narrow laneways. These two wheeled escapes in most cases could reach to window sills on floor levels and roofs of buildings now being constructed in the city and suburbia to 3 - 4 stories in height.

The Curricle ladders extended to 45 feet and were made up of three lengths 1 fixed and 2 sliding, these two lengths were

constructed on top of the bottom length which was fixed to a sliding metal frame attached to the sturdy wooden and metal bodywork on top of the cart which had a sloping top of approx. 30deg's when made up in the road travelling mode, with the heel of the ladders protruding well out over the horse and shafts approximately 7 feet off the ground level and the head of the ladder protruding downwards at rear approx. 2 feet off the ground.

The top length at its head had a small wheel attached allowing the ladders to ride up the wall of the building when being extended (if the ladder hit the wall below or near its intended objective) it had a crew of 4 men, the driver and the man in charge sat in the drivers seat one on either side of the ladders and 2 standing at rear holding onto the ladders.

On arrival at a fire the horse and cart was backed towards the wall of the building at right angles, the correct distance out for the height of the objective to be reached, i.e. window sill or roof parapet. The horse was then unharnessed from the shafts, the ladder safety locking bolts were removed and the front of the cart was lowered with its shafts resting at ground level. This allowed the heel of the ladder to slide and make contact with the ground between the shafts now at approximately 70degs of elevation. The wheels were chocked and the ladder now could be extended by hand winching around by cable drum via cables and pulleys, (the drum cable went from the drum up and around the pulley at the head of the fixed length and then down around a pulley at the heel of the first sliding length and then up and around a pulley at its head and then down and fixed to the heel of second top sliding length). The front of the cart acted as a buttress supporting the ladder when it was extended. The bottom fixed length and the first sliding length had wooden lattice side work supporting the ladder when extended against stress and strain. Final adjustments could be made by the crew if necessary before the head of the ladder reached the objective by removing the wheel chocks and moving the ladder by pulling or pushing on the wheels inwards or outwards from the building.

The Shand Mason single horse drawn 2 wheel fire escape, extending to 50 feet were similarly constructed as the Curricle Ladder Carts, the action of positioning the ladder cart, removing the horse from the shafts and lowering them down onto the ground, elevating and extending of the ladder etc. was almost identical as the curricle. In addition Stein had several ladder/hose carts which carried manually operated 20 and 30 feet extension ladders and hooked Pompier ladders, these carts also carried hoses, branch pipes, stand pipes and other essential fire fighting gear, and one salvage van, eight exercise carts for keeping the horses fit.

There was limited accommodation at fire stations for the permanent men and others lived in nearby houses rented by the Board and when alerted by the stations turn out bell they ran to the station to catch their detailed gear, the auxiliary firemen made their own way onto the fires either running, hitching a ride, or taking a Cab.

It is now expedient for me to halt Chief Officer Stein's story and will return, in my next instalment, to his tenure of office circa 1903, this is for my convenience, because I need to write of four of his old time volunteer colleagues (from 1891 until the time of their death or retirement). Three of these men now fought fires with Stein, after the Fire Brigade Act. became law. They continued to turn out to fires with him for the next 6 – 7 years, even though they were appointed to the first M.F.B. Board but still served him loyally until his retirement in 1908. The four men concerned were Samuel Mauger, (even though Stein and Mauger in the past had not seen "eye to eye") Sir Henry deKellet, James Ballenger, and Theophilus Smith Marshall, who, after amalgamation of the brigades, continued School Teaching until he was appointed Chief Officer of the Country Fire Brigades Board. I also will include the history of building the new M.F.B's Headquarters Station, No.1 at Eastern Hill and it's opening, of it's many additions and alterations over the years until it's de-commissioning in 1977 (it is now the Fire Services Museum Victoria) and the opening of the new No.1 Fire Station on the Corner Gisborne and Albert Streets.

Samuel Mauger, (pronounced "Major") was born on the 12th. November 1875 in Geelong and as a boy joined the local Chilwell - Newtown Fire Brigade, he proved to be a very keen lad and the Captain promoted him to being his assistant.

In the intervening years he attended "Allbricks" trades school where Mr. Eastwood taught him how to make silk hats. By 1873, at the age of 16 years, after months of unemployment travelled he up to Melbourne from Geelong as a steerage passenger on a sailing ship named "Despatch". He arrived with his carpet bag containing a change of under clothing and two books, and one shilling and six pence in his pocket. In Melbourne he continued on with his involvement with fire fighting, he was a young man of fixed

principals with many ideas and aspirations.

He founded the Fitzroy Volunteer Brigade and later the Clifton Hill Temperance Volunteer Brigade and was elected Superintendent of same. As you have previously read when in 1887 after Supt. James Ballenger resigned he was elected Secretary of the Metropolitan Fire Brigades Association.

A photograph of him circa 1934 shows him to be a smallish dapper man with thinning grey hair, he had a moustache joined to a circular grey clipped beard around his chin and wore round thin rimmed glasses. The photograph doesn't give any indication of him being a bold fire fighter with extraordinary leadership skills. He was known to be a genuine kind man and a determined social reformer. In the late 1890's he owned a Hat Shop in Bourke Street, and at the same time he was secretary of the "Anti Sweating League", he put much of his time into the leagues main issues of gaining shorter working hours and better wages for workers. Because of his endeavours in this regard the government eventually set up the first Wages Board system. Later on, in the 1940's until the 1970's, the United Fire Fighters Union could virtually bypass the Chief Officer and the M.F.B. Board and deal directly with the Independent Wages, the (Continued on page 10)

Industrial Appeals Board and other Tribunals etc. set up by the government for hearing arguments for and against and make unbiased decisions for better conditions and wages for firemen.

The Melbourne Fire Brigades Board were fortunate to have his acumen readily available to them during his 45 years of service. He was the right man for the right job in the right place and no doubt like many other men, for good or bad, over the years helped make the M.F.B. what it is. Amongst other things he was also working hard for shorter hours and more pay for the Shop Assistants Union. Oddly enough that was something he did not do for fire fighters in all his time on the M.F.B. Board!!! He voted against pay rises and other conditions that involved firemen that would cost money.

Despite all of this he was a very remarkable man indeed. He was the governments representative on the M.F.B. Board. From 1891 to 1936, he was President of the Board on five occasions, (1899, 1910, 1919, 1924 & 1934), he was a Justice of the Peace, and almost always Chairman of the Building & Plant committees well into the 1920"s. These committees dealt with finance and everything else in the brigade other than fire fighting costs which was entirely left to the Chief Officer.

He took and active and prominent part in the fight for Federation and at the first Federal elections was returned unopposed for the Melbourne Ports. In 1906 he was appointed Honorary Minister in the Deakin Administration as acting minister of Home Affairs, this portfolio took in Footscray, and for the first time it had the honour of being represented by a Cabinet Minister.

On the 30th. July 1907 he was promoted to Post Master General of the Commonwealth a position he held until the defeat of the Deakin Government. Under his administration postal and telephone services improved throughout the Commonwealth. During the first Federal Parliament he only missed two meetings and they were due to ill health. During his time he was President of the Melbourne Total Abstinence Society, a member of the Board of the Rechabites, President of the Gordon Institute for boys, President of the National Temperance League, Hon. Secretary of the Protectionist Association, Vice President of the Criminology Association, President of the Young Men's Christian Association, and was associated with Church and Sunday School work.

It was said that by the end of his career he knew as much about the running of the M.F.B. as anyone including J.H. Scattergood the first M.F.B. Secretary, (1891 - 1898) who was dismissed early in 1898 for misappropriation of Brigade funds, even succeeding Brigade Secretaries F. Gomm, (1898 – 1914), J. Dudley (1914 – 1941) and Chief Officers David Stein. (1891 – 1898), Harry Lee (1908 – 1927), and J.T. Wilkins (1927 – 1940).

Samuel Mauger died on the 26th. June, 1936. For over 45 years his interest never waned and gave unstinted and valuable service to the Melbourne Fire Brigades Board. In all he devoted 61 years of service to the Victorian Fire Services, his dedication to improving fire fighting methods and equipment influenced all brigades across the Commonwealth. Several years before he died, the Western Australian Fire Services honoured him with a fifty year Service Medal and some time later the Country fire Brigades

Board presented him their Long Service Medal.

The Argus, Herald, Sun, and the Age newspapers on June 28th. 1937 reported the memorial service and dedication of a Harcourt granite drinking fountain in his memory, it was erected several days earlier on the reserve opposite the Eastern side of the turnout bays of the Eastern Hill Fire Station. Attending the Service were the Chief Officer J.T. Wilkins, a parade of firemen in burnished brass helmets formed a guard of honour at the front of the flag draped memorial, the Fire Brigade Brass Band at side played music at intervals.

The late Samuel Mauger was Vice President of the Australian Prohibition Council and the Victorian Prohibition League. The esteem in which Mauger was held can be gauged from the fact that among his contributors to his memorial were employees of the Victorian Liquor and Allied Trades Union. The speakers were Mr. Blackburn M.H.R., Mr. J. Hume-Cook, who unveiled the memorial, Mr. Onley M.L.C., the Rev. Charles Strong, and Chief Fire Officer J.T. Wilkins and Mr. Gordon Sprigg, treasurer of the memorial fund.

The Hon. A.G. Wales, M.L.C. who in 1936 was the President of the M.F.B. Board, (City of Melbourne Representative) read a glowing obituary to him, the last paragraph of it read, "His memory will be revered not only for his personality but also for definite and successful determination to place at the disposal of this State and his fellow men rare and commanding powers of oratory and administration".

The Footscray Municipality Mayor, Cr. Hanmer proclaimed in late 1936 that a memorial for the late Samuel Mauger erected for his work as the champion of Industrial Social Reform in the interests of men and women all over Australia. It was decided to build a memorial picnic shelter approximately 24 ft. x 14 ft. made of solid blue stone, honeycomb blue stone, and sandstone complete with concrete picnic table and wooden bench seats. The original location was on a plantation reserve on the Corner Geelong Road & Barkley Street intersection. The last official duty of the retiring Mayor Cr. Hanmer was to officially open Footscray memorial to the late Samuel Mauger on the 28th. August 1937.A bronze plaque mounted over the North side doorway read:- Established by the citizens of Footscray to commemorate the fine civic service of the Hon. Samuel Mauger, M.P. 1936.

It was reported in the Footscray "Advertiser" on Saturday 12th. February 1938 that a regulation will be gazetted forbidding the consumption of intoxicating liquor in the Samuel Mauger Memorial shelter due to noisy drinking bouts being held there. Cr. Mc Arthur told fellow councillors at a council meeting of a complaint by citizens of another noisy drinking bout occurring on Saturday night 7th. Feb. and into the following early hours of Sunday morning, the council considered it was not a credit to the city. Mc Arthur commented that much of the vandalism locally was due to the laxity of the police, councillor Jacka pointed out that the police had to many extraneous duties to perform, suggested the forbidding of drinking and described the shelter "as nothing else but a drinking den" for drunkards.

Seven years later the Footscray "Advertiser" published a report on Feb. 3rd. 1945 that the shelter was in a disgraceful condition, more of a resting place for dead beats and vandals rather than for citizens who were expected to frequent it.

Consistent damage prompted the council to remove the tiled roof, ceiling and pillars and leave the table and seats open.


Samuel would have turned in his grave had he known the outcome of his memorial shelter as he was teetotal and was against alcohol all of his life Several years later the stone work of the shelter was pulled down, removed and rebuilt in a picnic/playground, East side near the Pioneer Hotel in Footscray Park.

James R. Ballenger In 1890 Ballinger, Superintendent of the Carlton Breweries Brigade and ex President of the Melbourne Fire Brigades Association, (worked on the draft bill) and at this time was a Major in the Australian Militia, was appointed government representative on the M.F.B. Board. In 1895 he was elected as President of the Board. In July 1917 after 26 years of dedicated service, always having the Melbourne Fire Brigades interests at heart, he resigned from the Board, by now he held the rank of Colonel in the militia.

Sir Henry deKellett who in 1890 was Captain of the Kew Municipal Brigade, (he also worked on the draft bill), in 1890 was elected onto the M.F.B. Board as the Southern Municipalities representative. In 1915 he was elected President of the Board and for 33 years like his old comrade Ballenger had the interests of the M.F.B. at heart. He passed away on the 20th. June 1924.

A little about "The Country **Fire Brigades**"

In 1890 when the fire brigade



For the appointment of a Chief Officer the Country Fire Brigades Board advertised three times in the leading Melbourne, Ballarat, Bendigo and Geelong papers for the position of a Chief Officer, at a salary of 600 pounds per annum and a free railway pass. Twenty applications were received, the name of the man the Board and Chief Secretary was looking for was not among the 20 applicants (that was Col. T.S. Marshal). After a ballot the names of three men, Hennah, Vance and Palmer were recorded for special consideration by the board. A further ballot resulted in the appointment of Captain W.H. Hennah, as Chief Officer (he was currently Captain of the Ballarat City Brigade). It's

surprising that the question of a Deputy Chief Officer was held over until the next meeting of the board, however the appointment of a Deputy Chief wasn't taken until more than 20 years later.

In late 1891 Chief Officer W.H. Hennah, resigned, it appeared that there had been some misappropriation of the Board Funds. Criticisms by Councils and from the Press influenced the Board to ask for him to be dismissed. There was an anomaly in the Act that all brigades were to be placed under local control, such control to be comprised of 1 Government representative, local Councils, Insurance Companies, and the Local Fire Brigades. It appeared that the Board and it's Chairman Cr. Burton did not have the authority to dismiss but could ask for a resignation, this was the best way of handling this delicate situation. Both Hennah and the Board Secretary W.S. Judd handed in their resignations and the Board accepted them, but immediately afterwards Judd was appointed to the dual position of Chief Officer and Secretary during the pleasure of the Board. Secretary Judd was instructed to notify the Fire Brigades Superintendents of Geelong, Ballarat, and Bendigo, that their services would not be required after Sept. 30th. 1892.

The Board decided to record in the minutes "that the resignation of Chief Officer W.H. Hennah has been accepted with regret and the same was accepted only on the grounds of the Board having adopted a more economical system of working in amalgamating the offices of Chief Officer and Secretary, and that a copy of this be given to him under the seal of the Board. After this the board decided to send a resolution to the Chief Secretary, with the request that he embody it with an amending Bill.

Theophilus Smith-Marshall,

was a Lieutenant Colonel in the Militia, he liked to be known as Colonel. Marshall. He was an absolute achiever, a born organiser and leader, who accomplished so much in his life time. The only way I can write of his many achievements and interests is to start from the time he was born in 1842 at Greenock, Scotland.

In 1865 as a young man of 23 years he migrated to Victoria, on arrival he T. S. Marshall, image courtesy



entered into the Education Fire Services Museum Victoria

Department, he resigned and in 1867 left Victoria to try his luck in the gold rush to Charleston, New Zealand. He was an unsuccessful miner and after several years he decided to return to Melbourne. He again applied to the Education Dept. to teach school and in 1870 was posted to the Chiltern Common School as its first Head Teacher. In 1871 he married fellow School Teacher Miss Margaret Fraser, they had 2 sons and 3 daughters.

The ROKEWOOD CROSS

Once upon a time there was a little Fire Station in the outer You Yangs called NORLANE

Its existence was totally ignored by Management and the higher ranks for it was feared that contact with the tribe who manned this Fire Station would infect those who transgressed with a virus, for all who occupied were United Firefighter Union members.

The Station was denied the opportunity of sharing the spoils and taking part in the many major fires that occurred as it was feared their presence may spread the virus.

But all was to change as the *RED STEER* had escaped and rampaging on the plains of Rokewood, causing destruction and fear. Every available appliance was dispatched and in desperation Norlane was called on to send its little red Tanker.

The fearless leader at Norlane selected his most capable Firefighters and Station Officer Kevin Stein with Firefighters Lenny Sheetz and Allan Boromeo was dispatched.

On their return Sheetz and Boromeo were overawed by the tactical brilliance and bravery displayed by Stein and insisted that a Medal be struck and awarded to Stein to commemorate the Battle of Rokewood

A formal parade was held and the dress of the day was butchers coats and flat caps, the citation was read and the Rokewood Cross a pinned on the breast of the recipient.

Thus, Kevin STEIN is the one and only holder of the coveted Rokewood Cross.

This bold group of Firefighters, Len SHEETZ, Kevin STEIN & Allan BOROMEO claimed to be the reincarnation of Rommels Panzers at Tobruk/El Alamain after their battle with the Red Steer at Rokewood.

Len Sheetz - represented the Geram Army,Kevin Stein -Rommel the Desert Fox, Allan Boroneo the Italian Army. With names like that there could be no dispute.

Thus, the Rokewood Cross was a combination of the Victoria Cross and the German Iron Cross




